HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION DECEMBER 17, 2018 DEMOLITION AND RELOCATION PERMITS HDP-2018-0648 1200 MONTOPOLIS DRIVE

PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1964 recreation center.

ARCHITECTURE

Two-story, rectangular-plan, front-gabled, painted brick and stuccoed institutional building with vertical metal panels covering the second story of the building; bands of aluminumframe windows with a horizontal configuration. The entrance to the building is perpendicular to the front façade.

RESEARCH

The Montopolis Recreation Center was built in 1964 by the Dolores Catholic Church as a community and recreation center. It was designed by the local architectural firm of O'Connell and Probst. The center was operated by a private non-profit until the City of Austin purchased the property in 1974. The building has had several modifications over the years, primarily for ADA accessibility and to replace deteriorated metal cladding and roofing panels. The adjacent Montopolis Health Center was constructed in 1978.

The Montopolis Recreation Center was one of the very few, if not the only, city recreation centers which offered training in boxing for neighborhood youth. Boxing competitions were held regularly at the Montopolis Recreation Center, as well as other activities, such as senior dances, classes, day-care services, and a playground for children. In addition, the center was the site of a 1971 rally led by Cesar Chavez during the famed Economy Furniture strike by Mexican-American workers.

According to the Austin Parks and Recreation website, "The Montopolis Recreation + Community Center will jointly replace two aging facilities and be co-operated by the Austin Parks and Recreation Department and Austin Public Health Department. This building will be rebuilt to provide over 33,000 square feet of new space, including a commercial kitchen, gymnasium, fitness room, computer lab, conference rooms and educational programming areas. The building's design seeks to support the initiatives of each partnering department by fostering mental and physical well-being through community recreation and the pursuit of healthy lifestyles." The project was approved in 2012 with a \$15 million bond issue.

STAFF COMMENTS

The building is not listed in any City survey to date.

Staff has evaluated this building for designation as a historic landmark and has determined that the while the building meets the community value criterion, it does not meet another criterion squarely, and should not be designated as a historic landmark:

- a. **Architecture.** The building represents 1960s institutional architecture with a low, horizontal appearance, and bands of aluminum-framed multi-light windows. However, this building does not exhibit sufficient architectural distinction to warrant individual designation under the criterion for architectural significance.
- b. **Historical association**. The building was built as a parish community center and taken over by the city of Austin in the early 1970s; the city has operated a recreation center in the building since that time. There do not appear to be significant historical associations.
- c. **Archaeology**. The building was not evaluated for its potential to yield significant data concerning the human history or prehistory of the region.
- d. **Community value**. The building has community value for its history of services to the Montopolis neighborhood, the poorest area of Austin for many years. The story of its purpose and use is important to commemorate, but it need not be accomplished with this building, as this building will be replaced with a new

community center that will provide better services to the neighborhood and the community.

e. Landscape feature. The property is not a significant natural or designed landscape with artistic, aesthetic, cultural, or historical value to the city.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Release the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center. The building does not meet the criteria for individual designation as a historic landmark, and is being replaced with a new, larger community and recreation center.
