# HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION JANUARY 28, 2019 DEMOLITION AND RELOCATION PERMITS HDP-2018-0678 1909 WILLOW STREET

#### **PROPOSAL**

Demolish a ca. 1917 house.

#### ARCHITECTURE

One-story, rectangular-plan, hip-roofed building with jerkinhead dormer; wood siding; 1:1 wood-sash windows.

#### RESEARCH

George and Bertha McClain lived at 1909 Willow Street from about 1918 until about 1927; Audie worked as a truck driver for the City of Austin, while Bertha worked as a seamstress for Charles Rosner, a ladies' clothing store. Longino and Lucy Monreal lived in the house from about 1955 until at least 1992. Longino worked as a presser and tailor for the Reynolds-Penland men's clothing company.

#### STAFF COMMENTS

The building does not appear to be eligible for designation as a historic landmark.

Designation Criteria—Historic Landmark

- 1) The building is more than 50 years old.
- 2) The building appears to retain a high degree of integrity.
- 3) Properties must meet two historic designation criteria for landmark designation (City of Austin Land Development Code, Section 25-2-352). The property does not appear to demonstrate significance according to any criteria.
  - a. **Architecture.** The house is a good example of a National Folk house. Iit does not appear to possess architectural distinction.
  - b. **Historical association**. George and Bertha McClain and Longino and Lucy Monreal lived in the house for approximately 10 years and 45 years, respectively. There do not appear to be significant historical associations.
  - c. **Archaeology**. The property was not evaluated for its potential to yield significant data concerning the human history or prehistory of the region.
  - d. **Community value**. The property does not appear to have a unique location, physical characteristic, or significant feature that contributes to the character, image, or cultural identity of the city, a neighborhood, or a particular group.
  - e. **Landscape feature**. The property is not a significant natural or designed landscape with artistic, aesthetic, cultural, or historical value to the city.

# STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage rehabilitation and adaptive reuse of the building. If the Commission votes to approve the application, then staff recommends relocation over demolition, and completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center.

## Background Research

Long-term tenants of 1909 Willow Street included George and Bertha McClain (ca. 1918-27) and Longino and Lucy Monreal (ca. 1955 to at least 1992).

George V. McClain was born in 1870 in Texas. He worked at a saloon in 1903, as a car repairman in 1909, and as a laborer in 1910. By 1912 he was working as a truck driver, a profession that he remained in until at least 1929. A 1935 city directory lists him as a farmer. The same year, the McClains were listed as living at 1914 Willow Street, where they lived with two grown sons and two grandchildren. George McClain died in 1950 in Austin.

Bertha Emelia Muhle McClain was born in 1969 in Paige, Texas, to German-born parents. She married George McClain in 1899 in Travis County, and the couple moved to Austin by 1901. They had two sons. Bertha worked as a seamstress for Charles Rosner, a ladies' clothing store located on Congress Avenue, from at least 1920 until 1927. She also was involved with the Order of the Eastern Star. Bertha McClain died in 1961 in Austin.

Longino "Lonnie" Cardenas (or Castillo) Monreal Jr. was born in 1923 to a Mexican immigrant family in Austin. He served in the Navy from 1944 until 1946. He worked for the Reynolds-Penland men's clothing company as a presser and tailor off and one from the late 1950s until the 1980s. In 1969 he was involved with the Central Coordinating Committee (CCC) of the Model Neighborhoods Program as a representative of Reynolds-Penland; the committee made recommendations for programs to the City Council. Longino Monreal died in 2000 in Austin.

Lucy (or Luz) Val Martinez Monreal was born in 1921 in Austin, also to a Mexican immigrant family. She married Longino Monreal in 1941, and the couple had at least three children. City directories do not list an occupation for Lucy, but the local newspaper reported in 1953 that she worked as a waitress at El Rancho and competed for the "Queen of Trays" waitress title for a benefit for the American Legion. She was vice president of the Monreal Foundation; no further information was located about the foundation. Lucy Monreal died in 1997 in Austin.

#### LUCY MARTINEZ MONREAL

Lucy Martinez Monreal, age 76, of Austin, died Wednesday, July 9, 1997.

Lucy enjoyed her children and friends. She was vice president of the Monreal Foundation and a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Lucy was a loving inspiration.

Survivors include her husband of 56 years, Longino C. Monreal Jr.; daughters, Rosalinda Monreal, Vivian M. Alvarez and husband, Paul, Sylvia M. Monreal and Belinda R.
