Additional Backup Information:

The contract is for critical incident stress management services for Austin-Travis County Emergency Medical Services (ATCEMS) personnel. The services provided by the contractor are specialized to treat mental health issues related to the stress and trauma experienced by ATCEMS employees who provide emergency medical care.

Dr. Tania Glenn and her counseling staff have provided critical incident stress management services for ATCEMS for more than 20 years. Dr. Glenn's organization has provided an exceptionally cost-effective support program as a reliable resource for ATCEMS. Furthermore, this organization has established trust and confidence with ATCEMS employees.

The current contract for these services expires July 2, 2019. Authorization amounts were determined based on historical spending and anticipated needs.
