PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1906-09 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story, frame wing-and-gable house with horizontal wood siding; partial-width porch with metal posts; single and paired 1:1 windows.

RESEARCH

The home's first owners were Benjamin and Della Morrall and their children. Benjamin worked as a freight agent for the H&TC railroad when he bought the lot from neighbor Celia Stavely in 1905. By 1916, he had returned to his original career at Western Union; he had been a pioneer of the telephone and telegraph industry in Austin, managing the service from 1884 to 1892. The Morralls lived in the house until 1924.

Short-term residents occupied the house until the 1950s, when it was purchased by the Davis family. Lola Davis had previously worked in patient care at the Austin State Hospital. Her husband Carney worked as a driver, and had also been previously employed by the hospital. Together, they operated the Davis Home for the Elderly at the house until the late 1960s.

By 1973, the house was occupied by Miguel and Lucy Ramos. Miguel Ramos worked for True Fit Boat Seats, and Lucy worked at the Data General computer assembly plant. The Ramos family lived in the home until at least 1992.

STAFF COMMENTS

The property was recommended contributing to a local and National Register historic district by the East Austin Historic Resource Survey (2016). A site plan for remodel and adaptive reuse of the structure was approved in 2017.


Designation Criteria—Historic Landmark

- 1) The building is more than 50 years old.
- 2) The building appears to retain a moderate to low degree of integrity.
- 3) Properties must meet two historic designation criteria for landmark designation (City of Austin Land Development Code, Section 25-2-352).
 - a. **Architecture.** The house is designed in a Folk Victorian style. It does not appear to possess architectural significance.
 - b. **Historical association**. There do not appear to be significant historical associations.
 - c. **Archaeology**. The property was not evaluated for its potential to yield significant data concerning the human history or prehistory of the region.
 - d. **Community value**. The property does not appear to have a unique location, physical characteristic, or significant feature that contributes to the character, image, or cultural identity of the city, a neighborhood, or a particular group.
 - e. **Landscape feature**. The property is not a significant natural or designed landscape with artistic, aesthetic, cultural, or historical value to the city.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage rehabilitation and adaptive re-use, then relocation over demolition, but release the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center. Though the house is part of an extant Folk Victorian grouping of buildings – a style that defined railroad-era South East Austin — it does not meet the criteria for individual designation as a historic landmark.

Death Takes Wire Pioneer

Ben Morrall, 78, longtime Austin resident and a pioneer here in the telephone and telegraph industry.

died last night.

Mr. Morrall, a native of England. had lived in Austin about 55 years and was one of the first managers of the Austin telephone system when there were only a few hundred subscribers. For about 25 years he was employed by the Western Union Telegraph company, serving for a time as its night manager; and was freight agent for the H. & T. C. railroad, now a part of the Southern Pacific.

His survivors include one son, Ben T. Morrall; two daughters, Mrs. Wylie E. Glaze and Mrs. Louis H. Blenderman; and three grandchil-

dren, all of Austin.

Funeral services will be conducted by the Rev. George Green tomorrow at 10:30 a. m. at Thurlow Weed Funeral home. Burial will be in Oakwood cemetery under auspices of the Hill City Lodge 456 of A. F. & A. M.

Ben Morrall, Sr., Night W. U. Manager, Retires

Benjamin Morrall Sr., 702 San Antonio street, night manager for the Western Union Telegraph company, celebrated his 70th birthday anniversary Saturday and his retirement on pension from the West-

ern Union service.

Mr. Morrall began his career with the old Erie Telephone and Telegraph company (now the Southwestern Bell Telephone company) on May 1, 1884, in Austin. He rcsigned this post in August, 1886, and became associated with the Western Union. In October, 1892, he became agent for the Houston and Texas Central railroad here and in December, 1913, was employed by the city of Austin. A year later, Dec. 1, 1914, he returned to the Western Union where he worked continuously until his re-tirement Saturday. Under Wester nUnion rules, an employe is retired at 70 and participates in the benefits of the company's pension fund.
