


2016 MOBILITY BOND - FUNDING BY CATEGORY



MBE/WBE OUTREACH



- MBE/WBE Outreach Program is essential to achieving the goals of the Corridor Construction Program.
 - Track MBE/WBE firm participation
 - Support increasing availability and capacity of Citycertified MBE/WBE firms
 - Encourage the creation of solicitation opportunities that target availability and capability of City-certified MBE/WBE firms

MBE/WBE OUTREACH PLAN



- 8 Key Issues identified by stakeholders which impact participation of MBEs and WBEs.
- Over half of the 35 action items have been completed or have commenced, including:
- Corridor Prep Course Commenced and Completed (September October 2019)
 - Five sessions meant to prepare MBE/WBE firms to work on City of Austin projects
 - Targeting firms that are certified for scopes of work included in the corridor program
- Amended the MBE/WBE Procurement Program Ordinance to eliminate annual certification updates and extend the certification period from 3 years to 4 years.
- Implemented a "rapid renewal" certification pilot program that targets firms who provide services necessary for the corridor program.
- Implemented a "rapid certification" initiative which has significantly decreased the certification application process from a 90 day to a 30 day period. To date, SMBR has certified 53 firms under this effort.
- Providing technical assistance to firms that want to ensure that their vendor profiles accurately reflect the services and products they offer.





- Over half of the 35 action items in the MBE/WBE (Minority Business Enterprise/Women Business Enterprise) Action Plan completed or have commenced


\$101M Voter-Approved Funding, 8-year Bond Cycle Timeline

Spicewood Springs Rd (\$17M)

- Preliminary Engineering Report (PER) complete and 30% design submitted last month (September 2019)
- Construction phase anticipated 2022



- 100% design submitted for Completeness Check/General Permit application (July 2019)
- Construction phase anticipated summer 2020

TXDOT-LED REGIONAL PROJECTS



Loop 360 Intersection Improvements (\$46M)

- Advanced Funding Agreement with TxDOT (June 2017)
- Environmental & schematic phase ongoing
- The improvements funded by the City include four intersections along Loop 360: Westlake Drive, Courtyard Drive, Lakewood Drive, and Spicewood Springs Road/Bluff Stone Lane





TXDOT-LED REGIONAL PROJECTS



• RM 620 at RM 2222 (\$7.5M)

- Advanced Funding Agreement with TxDOT (August 2017)
- Project 1 construction started (November 2018)
- Project 2 anticipated construction start fall 2019
- Anticipated construction completion summer 2020



TXDOT-LED REGIONAL PROJECTS



- Parmer Lane/FM 734 (\$17M)
 - Advanced Funding Agreement with TxDOT (June 2017)
 - Environmental Assessment clearance anticipated (November 2019)
 - Anticipated construction start 2022
- Old Bee Caves Rd Bridge (included in Oak Hill Parkway project build alternative)
 - \$3.3M local participation for ROW/utilities
 - TxDOT's contract award anticipated summer 2020 to begin designbuild
