1	RESOLUTION NO.
2	WHEREAS, there is a high demand that is not being met for shelters to
3	serve those who have experienced family violence; and
4	WHEREAS, during the COVID-19 local disaster, overall incidents of crime
5	have decreased while family violence rates have increased; and
6	WHEREAS, SAFE Alliance reports that as of May 28, 2020, 70 adults and
7	children were on their waitlist for admission and a number of households were
8	assessed as being medium/high or high risk for lethality; and along with SAFE
9	Alliance, there are a number of organizations in the Austin area offering differing
10	approaches to the emergency needs of survivors, including Hope Alliance and
11	Survive2Thrive who have used hotel rooms in 12 of hotels to place 98 adults and
12	children through their Sanctuary program; and
12	WHEREAS, preventing homelessness and supporting housing stability is a
13	public health priority during the COVID-19 local disaster; and
14	public hearth priority during the COVID-19 local disaster, and
15	WHEREAS, providing shelter for those who have experienced family
16	violence addresses homelessness as illustrated by the following statistics:
17	• 80% of U.S. moms experiencing homelessness had previously
18	experienced family violence,
19	• 70% of people experiencing homelessness in Austin/Travis County report
20	that past trauma or abuse caused their current homelessness, and
21	• 76% of youth experiencing homelessness have experienced foster care,
22	juvenile justice, or both; and
23	WHEREAS, an existing hotel with the following features could be

renovated to serve hundreds of families as protective shelter from family violence:

25	Approximately 70-100 furnished noter rooms, including studios, one-
26	room, and two-room suites, with kitchenettes,
27	• an outdoor space, common areas, onsite residential laundry facility,
28	• located in a safe, walkable, residential area, close to a grocery store and
29	neighborhood schools, and on a bus line, and
30	• property has a controlled entrance and front desk and is able to be fenced
31	and secured; and
32	WHEREAS, the City, at its discretion, could choose for such a repurposed
33	hotel to operate as protective shelter, or as a mix of protective shelter and bridge
34	housing or permanent supportive housing, depending on need and available funds;
35	NOW, THEREFORE,
36	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AUSTIN:
37	The City Manager is directed to analyze and consider, as part of the City
38	Manager's Fiscal Year 20-21 budget development process, the funding necessary
39	to acquire a hotel and fund a service provider to operate and manage the property
40	as protective shelter from family violence. Such a project should be analyzed and
41	considered, in context with solutions that leverage hotels or other shelter without a
42	real estate purchase, above and beyond the City's existing hotel acquisition
43	strategy.
