2	WHEREAS, Black Lives Matter; NOW, THEREFORE,			
3	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AUSTIN:			
4	The Council directs the City Manager to ensure the City's policies and			
5	policing policies conform to the policy directives and goals of the Council as state			
6	in this Resolution, with an acknowledgement that this is not an exhaustive list and			
7	will require future additions:			
8	1. Use of Tear Gas: It is the stated policy of the City that police use of tear			
9	gas is strictly prohibited.			
10	2. <u>Use of Force</u> : It is the stated policy of the City that:			
11	• Use of deadly force against individuals, including persons fleeing			
12	(in vehicle or on foot), shall be limited to situations where			
13	necessary for self-defense or defense of others against an imminent			
14	deadly threat or threat of serious bodily injury, and either there			
15	were no other reasonable alternatives to prevent serious injury, or			
16	death or all reasonable alternatives have been exhausted;			
17	• Use of impact munitions on crowds or on those exercising their			
18	First Amendment rights is strictly prohibited;			
19	• Use of beanbag rounds, rubber bullets and other munitions, tasers,			
20	and other implements of less-than lethal force shall be limited to			
20	instances where a person poses an imminent threat of death or			
22	serious bodily harm, and either there were no other reasonable			
~~	serious boarry narm, and entier there were no other reasonable			

alternatives to prevent serious injury or death, or all reasonable 23 alternatives have been exhausted; 24 Use of force shall incorporate de-escalation tactics in all 25 circumstances, and the response shall be proportionate to the 26 seriousness of the offense and the threat of harm presented; and 27 Austin Police Department General Orders (General Orders) 28 requiring officers to intervene to stop improper or excessive uses 29 of force by their fellow officers should be appropriately enforced. 30 The City Manager shall annually report to Council aggregate data 31 reflecting: (1) the number of investigations into officers' alleged 32 violation of the General Orders relating to use of force; and (2) the 33 number of investigations into officers' alleged violation of General 34 Orders creating a duty to intervene to stop excessive force. In 35 connection with this report, the City Manager, along with the 36 Office of Police Oversight, shall provide appropriate 37 recommendations to Council. 38 The City Manager shall direct the Office of Police Oversight to 39 research and issue recommendations for amendments to the General 40 Orders on how to better define what constitutes "resistance" and 41 alternative tactics and tools that can be used by officers to prevent the 42 need for lethal or less lethal munitions, including a review of police 43 techniques used in countries that use unarmed patrol forces. 44 Review and revision of the General Orders to implement this 45 46 policy directive shall be conducted in an open process that is facilitated

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by the Office of Police Oversight and includes feedback from

48 community groups. The City Manager shall ensure that revisions to such
49 General Orders incorporate comprehensive reporting of uses of force and
50 use of force threats. The Office of Police Oversight should be allocated
51 the necessary funding to facilitate this process.

- 52 3. <u>Chokehold Use</u>: It is the stated policy of the City that the use of
  53 chokeholds and strangleholds -- broadly defined to include all maneuvers
  54 that involve choking, holding the neck, or cutting off blood flow in the
  55 neck -- is strictly prohibited as a policing tactic.
- 4. Military Equipment: It is the stated policy of the City that the use, 56 stockpile, and purchase of military equipment shall be reduced to the 57 greatest extent possible. Equipment described by their manufacturer or 58 owner as "military-grade," "military surplus," "military tested," or any 59 similar language indicating such equipment is intended for military 60 use shall not be purchased or accepted by the City without prior approval, 61 either on a case-by-case basis or as an approval for a particular type of 62 equipment in general. Any contract that includes military equipment must 63 clearly state that it includes such equipment in the posting language of 64 the item brought to Council. The Council directs the City Manager to 65 inventory all existing military equipment and report to Council with 66 recommendations for items that can be properly disposed or returned if 67 required. This policy applies to any and all equipment acquired by the 68 Austin Police Department (APD) through the U.S. Department of 69 Defense's Law Enforcement Support Office (known as the 1033 70 Program), or any similar program. 71

5. No-Knock Warrants: It is the stated policy of the City that the use of no-72 knock warrants should be restricted, that a sufficient deadly threat or 73 threat of serious bodily injury must exist and no reasonable alternatives 74 exist to justify any such warrant being sought and executed, and that a 75 process be in place for the reporting of the execution of such warrants. In 76 reviewing the General Orders relevant to no-knock warrants, the City 77 Manager is directed to evaluate policies restricting no-knock warrants 78 that have been adopted by other large cities that exemplify the City's 79 policy as stated in this Resolution, and any City policy should include 80 comprehensive reporting on any and all raids including the reasoning for 81 and result of each. 82

6. Facial Recognition: It is the stated policy of the City that neither facial 83 recognition technology designed or used to identify members of the 84 public, nor information obtained from such facial recognition technology, 85 shall be used by the City for criminal investigation purposes, law 86 enforcement, or surveillance purposes—such a policy applies across City 87 operations. If such information is obtained by the City inadvertently, or if 88 APD determines that the gathering of such information or use of such 89 technology is necessary due to imminent threat or danger, it must be 90 approved by the City Manager and promptly reported to the Council and 91 public with full details about the purpose of such use, how long 92 information will be retained, who information is shared with, and 93 protections for the public. Purchases of such technology must be 94 approved by the Council. 95

All changes to the General Orders made pursuant to this Resolution must be
reported back to the Council and relevant Council committees for feedback before
they are implemented.

## 99 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:**

The City Manager is directed to delay the cadet class for APD currently scheduled to start in July 2020 until the majority of the Council agrees that the curriculum for future cadet classes meets the goals of Resolution No. 20191205-066 and allows the class to be conducted.
