2 3	WHEREAS, the Imagine Austin Comprehensive Plan envisions an Austin
4	that is livable, with economically integrated communities that provide affordable
5	housing options for residents and families of different backgrounds and different
6	means; and
7	WHEREAS, mandatory inclusionary zoning programs are proven policy
8	tools that cities across the country use to ensure affordable rental and ownership
9	housing for residents is available by requiring new development to make a certain
10	portion of new units available at affordable levels; and
11	WHEREAS, the Texas Legislature in 2005 passed, and the governor signed,
12	a law prohibiting local governments from implementing mandatory inclusionary
13	zoning policies that require the provision of affordable housing when developing
14	property; and
15	WHEREAS, the City Council has adopted plans calling for, and received
16	recommendations in favor of, inclusionary zoning and changes to the state
17	prohibition on inclusionary zoning, including:
18 19 20 21 22	• The Imagine Austin Comprehensive Plan, which identifies advocating for a repeal of the state's prohibition on inclusionary zoning as a strategy for supporting the City's ability to accomplish its housing goals;
23 24 25	• The Austin Strategic Housing Blueprint, which describes the state's inclusionary zoning prohibition as one of the "Top Five High Priority Fair Housing Barriers in Austin" and recommends a strategy of

26	pursuing legislation to repeal that prohibition and allow inclusionary
27	zoning policies;

29	• The "Uprooted" report that researchers of the University of Texas at
30	Austin produced and delivered to the City Council, which identifies
31	inclusionary zoning as a key tool that local governments around the
32	country use to provide affordable housing;
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34	• The Anti-Displacement Task Force Final Report, which recommends
35	advocating at the state legislature to restore local governments' ability
36	to implement inclusionary zoning policies; and

38	WHEREAS, under existing state law, the City has been limited to
39	implementing only voluntary bonus programs that incentivize rather than require
40	provision of affordable housing in new development; and
	WIFDEAC research into inclusion on housing policies indicates that

44	WHEREAS, State Representative Gina Hinojosa, who represents central
45	Austin, filed House Bill (HB) 3050 during the 86th Texas Legislative Session to
46	repeal this prohibition on inclusionary zoning, yet the bill never received a hearing;

48	WHEREAS, the City Council unanimously adopted Council Resolution
40	20100228 041 in summant of UD 2050, and
49	20190328-041 in support of HB 3050; and
50	WHEREAS, State Representative Gina Hinojosa continues to support
50	WHENERS, State Representative Onla Innojosa continues to support
51	inclusionary housing policies, and has reintroduced legislation to repeal the
51	menore repear to repear the

prohibition on inclusionary zoning through HB 84 for the 87th Texas Legislative
Session; and
