















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









Confirmed COVID-19 vaccine breakthrough cases by manufacturer reported to Austin Public Health, Travis County, Texas, Jan. 1-Aug 13,2021 (n=2,663)



- Of 2,663 confirmed breakthrough cases, symptom status was known for 812 case patients.
- Of those, 88.2% were symptomatic.
- 41 patients were hospitalized for COVIDrelated reasons:
 - o 19 females, 22 males
 - Age range 21-96 years old, median 77 years old
 - 10 received Janssen, 10 received
 Moderna, and 21 received Pfizer.
- Twelve COVID-19 associated deaths were reported among the confirmed cases.
 - o 5 males, 7 females
 - Age range 45-96 years old, median 78.5 years
 - o 1 was a resident at a LTCF
 - 6 received Pfizer, 4 received Moderna, and 2 received Janssen.





Travis County Health Authority COVID-19 Recommendations for Long Term Care & Group Living Facilities

Highlights

- Close monitoring is ongoing by the LTC Taskforce at APH
- Covid-19 CDC protocols are being followed
- Staff and Residents are tested according to CDC protocols

Readmission/Admission of New or Current COVID-19 Positive Resident to Long Term Care or Group Living Facility

- Resident is permitted for (re)admission only if COVID-19 positive isolation wing that meets
 HHSC/CMS guidelines is in place
- Facility must also have experience with and capability to provide management of COVID-19 patients with precautions including adequate PPE type and supply
- Facilities must have the appropriate number of staff available to work the facility, including designated staff for COVID-19 positive wings.

Closure to Readmissions/Admission for unvaccinated COVID-19 negative residents is triggered by the following:


- 3 or more positive cases among residents or staff until there are no new positive cases for 14 days. Testing of all staff and residents must occur on day 14
 - o Readmissions can resume when no new cases have been identified for 14 days
 - Please email NursingHomeInfo@AustinTexas.gov for final clearance after you finish your testing
 - o Fully vaccinated COVID-19 negative residents can continue to be admitted to a cold zone unit in an outbreak facility

Please Note the Following Points for ALL Long Term Care or Group Living Facilities


- Required routine testing frequency for SNFs is based on CMS positivity rates for Travis County and should include both vaccinated and unvaccinated staff per Travis County Health Authority. Travis County Health Authority recommends ALFs follow same recommendations for routine testing as SNFs
- Outbreak Testing-Travis County Health Authority recommend ALFs and ICFs adopt same <u>CDC testing strategies recommended for nursing homes</u>: The facility should consider testing more frequently (e.g., every 3 days) for the first two weeks of the outbreak, then test less frequently (e.g., every 7 days) thereafter until no new cases for 14 days. Testing should also be done on all residents and staff on day 14 from the last positive test
- For SNFs: All unvaccinated staff must wear N-95 mask instead of surgical mask while on the facility campus whether there are positive cases of COVID-19 in the facility or not, per Travis County Health Authority



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


Progress to Herd Immunity 8.16.21


Pflugerville Testing Outreach

Vaccine Dashboard Update









Pflugerville Vaccine Outreach

The Austin Public Health COVID-19 Education & Vaccination Program is offering several recurring vaccination opportunities in the 78660 zip code at the following locations:

- Cele Middle School
- Relley Lane Middle School
- Pflugerville Middle School
- Westview Middle School
- Harmony Science Academy

These events are planned in consultation with school administrators and are open to the public.

Austin Public Health is current working to identify additional spaces at which to offer regular vaccination opportunities.

Vaccine Booster

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) recommended that people whose immune system are moderately to severely compromised receive an additional dose of mRNA COVID-19 vaccine at least **28 days after an initial two-dose mRNA series** (Pfizer or Moderna).

- Immunocompromised individuals may discuss with their health care provider whether getting an additional dose is appropriate for them.
- If their health care provider is not at a site administering vaccines, these individuals can self-attest and receive the additional dose wherever vaccines are offered.





Vaccine Booster Criteria

Boosters are recommended for those that meet the following criteria:

- Receiving treatment for solid tumors or blood cancers
- Taking immunosuppressing medications after a solid organ transplant
- Within 2 years of receiving CAR-T therapy or a stem cell transplant
- Who have primary immunodeficiencies rare genetic disorders that prevent the immune system from working properly
- With advanced or untreated HIV
- Taking high-dose corticosteroids (more than 20 milligrams of <u>prednisone</u> or its equivalent daily), alkylating agents, antimetabolites, chemotherapy, TNF blockers, or other immunomodulating or immunosuppressing biologics
- With certain chronic medical conditions, such as <u>chronic renal disease</u> or asplenia living without a spleen
- Receiving dialysis





Media Update

Continue to provide interviews with local, state, and national media discussing changing situation. Over 60+ inquiries last week

Key points of discussion:

- Patients in the ICU are sicker and staying in the hospitals longer than prior surges putting more strain on hospital resources
- ICU staff are seeing a younger population in our hospitals
- The Delta variant passes from person to person with more ease than before which means we need to be more vigilant with the hygiene practices that we know work (masks, washing hands, watching distance)

Back to school focused messaging: Kids older than 12 getting vaccinated, and under 12 wearing masks and staying home when sick.
