






Evacuations, Expectations

- Traffic on a Tuesday...
- Expectations for AFD's role
- What we learned from the evacuation simulation







- You may be directed to a Temporary Assembly Point at a safe location such as 1. Vandergrift High School (9500 McNeil Dr) or 2. Target Parking Lot (111220, RM 2222).
- Routes and destinations will be determined by law enforcement during the evacuation.
- Safely make your way out of the area. If unable to evacuate, go to the closest Community Refuge Area.
- Yield to incoming response vehicles and do not drive over hoselines.
- Listen for instructions and follow direction from emergency personnel.








What does a Fire Adapted Community Look Like?








71% of Wildland Urban Interface Boundary is Privately Owned

Next Steps, Cont'd

- Community level evacuation planning –
 exploring platforms to assist with this.
- Continue to expand footprint of community level CWPPS (Community Wildfire Protection Plans)
- Exploring how to continue the CCC (Civilian Conservation Corp) relationship
- Exploring expanding fuels mitigation capacity
- Streamlined Rx fire permit process in order to burn more on City properties.
