# HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION DEMOLITION AND RELOCATION PERMITS MARCH 28, 2022 2206 East Side Drive

## PROPOSAL

Relocate a ca. 1915-1920 house outside city limits.

### ARCHITECTURE

One-story Craftsman bungalow with partial-width covered porch supported by tapered columns atop brick piers, 1:1 screened wood windows, exposed rafter tails at eaves, and triangular brackets at gable ends.

### RESEARCH

The house at 2206 East Side Drive, formerly known as 2210 East Side Drive and 2210 Goodall Street, was built by the Wright family in the early twentieth century as part of the family's dairy farm. City directories do not include records prior to the 1930s, as the farm was located outside the city limits.

The Wright family had operated a dairy farm in South Austin since at least 1899.<sup>1</sup> Claude W. Wright, Sr., and his wife Ethel Bowling Wright inherited the business from William W. Wright, who migrated to Texas from Mississippi after serving in the Confederate army as a teenager. Claude Wright, known as "Cap," also served as a city fireman<sup>2</sup> after his retirement from the dairy industry in 1946, a post he held for nearly twenty years.

After the Wright family sold the dairy farm, the house became a rental property to several families. Renters during the 1940s and 1950s included clerks, butchers, saleswomen, and manufacturing employees.

# **PROPERTY EVALUATION**

# Designation Criteria—Historic Landmark

- 1) The building is more than 50 years old.
- 2) The building appears to retain high integrity. However, the building's integrity of setting has been compromised, as it no longer retains the rural surroundings appropriate for an agricultural complex, nor does it retain significant associated outbuildings present in historic photos.
- 3) Properties must meet two criteria for landmark designation (LDC §25-2-352). Staff has evaluated the property and determined that it may meet two criteria:
  - *a*. Architecture. The building is a Craftsman bungalow.
  - *b.* Historical association. The property appears to have been part of the Wright dairy farm prior to the widespread urbanization of South Austin.
  - *c*. Archaeology. The property was not evaluated for its potential to yield significant data concerning the human history or prehistory of the region.
  - *d.* Community value. The property does not possess a unique location, physical characteristic, or significant feature that contributes to the character, image, or cultural identity of the city, the neighborhood, or a particular demographic group.
  - *e*. Landscape feature. The property is not a significant natural or designed landscape with artistic, aesthetic, cultural, or historical value to the city.


Approve the relocation upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package.

A very interesting thing contained in Dr. Swift's special report on the dairies is the suggestion that the per-centage ratings which he has given all the dairies be published in the pa-pers for the guidance of the citizens. The score card adopted by him makes 500 points a perfect score—100 points being allowed for the health of the herd and its protection; 100 for clean-liness of the cows and their surround-ings; 100 for construction and care of the utenalis; 100 for health of the em-ployee and manner of milking, and finally, 100 points for handling of the milk. "If the total score is 160 or above, the sanitary conditions are excellent;

The inspector reports that he has made recent analyses of the milk of each dairy to ascertain the percentage of butter fat, and has found in every case 34 per cent or more-in many cases very much more-this being the mini-mum below which good milk should not fall. The milk from W. W. Wright's dairy reached T per cent. "The conditions are improving rap-idiy," the report concludes, "and Aus-in is gretting a safe milk supply. The dairymen generally are showing a great deal of interest in the inspection work and are vieing with each other in bringing their product up to the high-est standard."
