Background



- City Code requires that the City Auditor perform regular audits of a sample of registered lobbyists' filings
- We also looked at whether City Code requires lobbyists to report virtual meetings


Finding 1

Sampled lobbyists' filings were largely compliant with City Code requirements. We identified an issue related to late fees for one lobbyist.

- 11% random sample of lobbyists—12 of 13 were compliant
- City should have assigned more late fees to one lobbyist
- Late fees are issued manually

Additional Observation

Austin's City Code only requires that lobbyists report in-person meetings with City officials. Also, the City is not using consistent methods to track lobbyist meetings.



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
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Chapter 4-8-8(C) of City Code

"A person who communicates in person with a City official for compensation on behalf of another person during a scheduled meeting on a municipal question shall disclose in writing to the city department, or office..."

Virtual Meeting Tracking Methods

- Received information from three departments and nine Council offices
- Collection methods included:
 - Electronic form linked in an email signature (see example at right)
 - Maintaining meeting information in electronic calendars

Virtual Meetings in Peer Governments

- Dallas and San Antonio require that lobbyists report virtual meetings
 - However, information about meeting dates is not required
- Texas treats in-person and virtual meetings the same for reporting, but reporting is not required if spending thresholds are not met
