The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, is allocating federal funds to the Austin Public Health Department from the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act of 2020 for DP21-2109 - Community Health Workers for COVID Response and Resilient Communities. The City has been awarded \$1,432,565 for the Year 2 budget of a three-year Chronic Disease Community Health Worker Train, Deploy, Engage grant program. Funding for Year 3 is dependent on the federal budget needed to continue the program. This project will train, deploy, and engage community health workers in COVID-19 response and to address underlying social factors and chronic disease health factors negatively impacting communities of color in Travis County. The catchment area of this project is the entirety of Travis County, and priority populations are Hispanic/Latinx and Black/African American communities located predominately in the 15 Eastern ZIP codes of Travis County known as the "Eastern Crescent." These zip codes face significantly higher poverty rates than Travis County overall.

This project will enhance training, deployment, and engagement of community health workers within Austin/Travis County to support COVID-19 prevention and vaccine promotion efforts, increase access and linkages to social and health services, and improve health through resilience/chronic disease prevention interventions. This project will significantly expand community health worker programs in Austin and Travis

County by funding community health worker positions in community, clinical, and public and affordable housing sectors. The community health workers will conduct engagements with the community to enhance vaccine confidence and uptake through presentations, block walking, small group conversations, and other methods to connect individuals to vaccine resources. Using the United Way's ConnectATX platform, the community health workers will provide screening, referral, and follow-up to address social determinants of health. The community health workers will also receive training on resiliency/chronic disease prevention curricula (such as evidence-based programs for physical activity promotion, diabetes education and prevention, and tobacco cessation) and provide these curricula throughout the three years of the project to address underlying chronic conditions that have led to disproportionate COVID-19 outcomes. Program evaluation activities will be supported through a contract with the University of Texas School of Public Health-Austin Campus.

This project directly supports the following Strategic Direction 2023 Health and Environment Strategies:

Strategy #1: Promote healthy living and well-being with a particular focus on areas and communities with high rates of chronic disease and high-risk behaviors who lack access to services

Strategy #2: Provide and/or support initiatives that can connect those seeking wellness and medical care with the appropriate providers and help them navigate and overcome critical barriers to obtaining health and mental health services (e.g., getting to appointments, cost of care)

This project is also aligned with the Austin Public Health Department Strategic Direction Goals:

Goal #2: Prevent and control chronic disease and risk factors

Goal #6: Prevent and control the spread of HIV, sexually transmitted infections, tuberculosis, and vaccine preventable diseases within the general population.

The General Fund will not be required to contribute additional funds beyond those currently budgeted to this grant. When the grant funds expire, the Austin Public Health Department's need for continued funding will be evaluated and may be denied.
