Posting Language

Authorize negotiation and execution of agreements with five social service agencies to provide behavioral health services to individuals who have or are experiencing homelessness for an initial 12-month term beginning October 1, 2022 in a combined amount not to exceed \$1,225,000, with one 12-month extension option in a combined amount not to exceed \$1,225,000, for a total agreement amount not to exceed \$2,450,000 divided among the agencies.

Fiscal Note

Funding in the amount of \$1,225,000 is available from the U.S. Department of the Treasury, American Rescue Plan Act. Funding for the remaining term is contingent upon available funding in future budgets.

Prior Council Action:

March 25, 2021 - Council approved Resolution No. 20210325-111 initiating the development of a spending framework for COVID-19 relief, which included homelessness as a funding priority, on an 11-0 vote.

Approval of this item will authorize the negotiation and execution of agreements with Austin Clubhouse, Family Eldercare, Caritas, Sunrise Community Church, and Youth Family Alliance to provide behavioral health services to individuals experiencing housing instability.

These agreements were awarded through the request for proposal (RFP), RFP 2022-006 Homeless Supportive Services. The RFP was informed by the Homeless Strategy Division and released on May 31, 2022. Two optional pre-bid meetings were conducted on June 2, 2022 and June 7, 2022. Applications were due July 7, 2022. Over 650 vendors were solicited, resulting in the submission of twenty-two proposals. Of those submitted, seven proposals were submitted for behavioral health services and five proposals were awarded.

The application evaluation process used set criteria to uniformly review all applicants evaluated by a separate and independent panel. A review panel comprised of individuals with education and expertise in the issue-area rated each application. Evaluators agreed upon strengths and weaknesses of each application, and each received a resultant score based on this process. The criteria for evaluation included the following: fiscal and administrative capacity, experience and cultural competence/racial equity; program design and performance metrics; data-informed program management; and cost effectiveness.

On March 11, 2021, the American Rescue Plan Act was signed into law, establishing the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds Program. The American Rescue Plan Act funds are intended to support ongoing recovery efforts in Austin and Travis County and respond to the COVID-19 public health emergency by meeting urgent community needs. The American Rescue Plan Act award funds will be used for activities that respond to the COVID-19 public health emergency or its negative economic impacts, including those impacts related to food access and the local food system.

The Austin Public Health Department awarded five proposals, each with an initial base term of 12 months, and one 12-month extension option.
