

In FY22, AFD frontline apparatus were involved in 71 vehicle collisions while responding to an incident.







# EMERGENCY INCIDENT Q3 COMPARISON





Measured from Call Receipt by AFD/EMS to Arrival On Scene.











AFD's goal is to respond to emergency incidents within 8 Minutes 90% of the time, from call receipt to first arriving frontline unit. \*Due to unprecedented changes to response protocols in 2020 for Covid-19, Calendar Year 2019 has been used as comparison.

## Auto Aid - Travis County & Williamson County



Auto Aid: Interlocal agreement to help dispatch the closest unit to a 911 call regardless of fire department or jurisdiction.

- Recent Auto Aid contract changes:
  - Automatic Aid agreement in place with ESD 2 for Priority 1 Medical calls only and with ESD 12 for Priority 1 Medical calls and vehicle rescues.
- Tellus Hub Software implemented to connect Travis County and Williamson County Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) systems.
  - Technical issues are being resolved.

## Overdose Response



- December 2021 All AFD personnel received hands on training for Naloxone administration and each unit received a stock of the medication
- Medication is stored in Pelican cases with interior insulation and an exterior digital thermometer to ensure adequate temperature range
- In FY22 Q3, there were a total of 169 calls where the patient was given Narcan by either AFD, EMS, or a bystander.
  - AFD administered or assisted 121 times.
  - Of those 121, patient improvement was seen in 107 cases (88%).






### AFD Wildfire Division



AFD Wildfire Division's High Fire Danger Step Plan includes:

- Mobilization and staffing of a Wildfire Task
  Force that stands ready to respond and
  provide daily fire weather situational
  reports that include current state fire
  activity, resource deployment, and staffing
- Activation of Division GIS resources for map creation, public awareness, & HSEM
- Issue set-up plan recommendations, which vary based on event and may include:
  - Wildland PPE on all units
  - BTs shadow ENGs
  - Upgrade GRASS to BRUSHL and BRUSHL to BRUSH
  - Staffing select BTs
  - Staffing SF Helo Specialist
  - Staffing additional Command Element
  - Staffing WFTF




## The Compliance Engine

The Compliance Engine (TCE) database tracks compliance and non-compliance for all fire protection systems in commercial properties across the City of Austin.

This allows the Austin Fire Department to track annual fire systems reports, deficiencies and repair reports and receive immediate notification of system impairments.

#### Smoke Alarms

The Austin Fire Department has a vision for every home and every citizen to be protected by at least one smoke alarm.

AFD's Free Smoke Alarm Program offers free smoke alarms to homeowners that live in the City of Austin Fire Department's Jurisdiction and are in need of working smoke alarms.

### Red Angels Program

Red Angels Program supports our most vulnerable citizens—the elderly, disabled, and socially/economically/underdeveloped communities. Through this initiative, AFD collaborates with Austin Community College registered nurses and:

- Conducts in home fire safety assessments
- Provides/installs smoke alarms, as needed
- Provides fire safety educational information and information on available community resources
- Nurses conduct in-home basic "well-checks"






## AFD Sworn Separations

- Average Years of Service:
  - -Retirements: 28.5 Years
  - -Resignations: **5.4** Years
- AFD experiences roughly 3.5 separations per month







## Cadet Hiring Process

#### **FY22 Updates**

- Fire Cadet hiring process began in March 2021 and will produce a 2-year hiring list set to expire June 14, 2023. AFD received a total of 3,250 Applications for a projected 192 available Fire Cadet positions.
- In August 2021, the initial hiring list had 1,516 Applicants ranked based on test scores from the Written Exam and Structured Oral Process. The top 460 Ranks moved forward into the Pre-Hire Assessments (Medical, Psychological assessment, Physical Ability testing and background check). The Final Hiring list ended with 196 qualified candidates.
