




Incidents, Patient Contacts, Transports Jan. 2021 - Sept. 2022



P1 Compliance by District FY22 Q4




P1 Response Interval by District FY22 Q4




Priority Percentage By District FY22 Q4






Sworn Separations


Q4 Sworn Separations by Type




Sworn Tenure at Separation

- EMS Entry Medic Academy Graduation December 2nd
 - 25 Field Medics
 - 1 Communication Medic
- 2023 EMS Entry Medic Academy Dates
 - January 30
 - 198 initial applicants, 43 current in process
 - List finalized week of December 12th
 - April 24
 - Application deadline December 12th
 - July 17
 - October 9
- 2023 EMS Lateral Field Clinical Specialist Academy
 - January 30
 - 80 applications submitted, 24 current in process
 - List finalized after December 15th




Opioid Overdoses – EMS Data

Each spring/summer has seen an upward bump in opioid ODs

Each spring raised the baseline for the rest of the year

- 2020 – at the beginning of the pandemic
- 2021
- 2022 – the largest increase. Associated with a significant increase in the amount of Fentanyl being reported



Pop-Up Resource Clinics (PURCs)

- Initiative began in 2017 (paused from 2/2020 – 7/2021)
- 4-hour scheduled event, usually outdoors
- Organized by ATCEMS Community Health Paramedic program
- Events connect people experiencing homelessness with several services in one place
- Primary partners participating and providing services include:
 - Community Care Clinic
 - Austin Public Health
 - Integral Care
 - Ending Community Homelessness Coalition (ECHO)
 - Central Health
 - Veteran's Assistance
 - Austin Animal Center
 - Sunrise Church
 - Multiple substance use and harm prevention groups



Pop-Up Resource Clinics (PURCs)

- Attendees can receive:
 - Direct medical care from a doctor or nurse practitioner
 - MAP funding and card
 - Immunizations
 - STD and other Infectious disease testing
 - Animal care
 - Coordinated assessment for housing assistance
 - Service point ID card for homeless services
 - Substance abuse services and support
 - Connection to mental health services
 - Veteran services



Pop-Up Resource Clinics (PURCs)

- Locations are determined based on:
 - EMS call volume for Persons Experiencing Homelessness (PEH)
 - Boots on the ground reconnaissance of PEH populations and their needs
 - Clinics rotate between Central, North, and South regions
- PURCs attendance
 - Average = 58 attendees; peek 106
- Services delivered
 - Average = 147 services delivered (in 4 hours); peek = 261
- PURCs in FY 2022: 7
