PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1912 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story pyramidal hipped-roof house clad in horizontal wood siding, with partial-width inset porch supported by boxed columns, a central chimney, and exposed rafter tails at eaves.

RESEARCH

The house at 2203 E. Cesar Chavez Street, alternately addressed as 2203 E. 1st Street, was constructed around 1912 by carpenter W. Burt Haston. Haston and his family lived in the house until around 1920, when it was rented to a roofer and his wife. It was briefly owned by Amos Franklin, who worked as a teamster, before being sold to the Kuehn family around the mid-1920s. Paul Kuehn worked as a carpenter, while Emily Kuehn was active in the Lutheran church. Their children Albert, Hildegard, and Hertha also lived in the family home; Hertha was a nurse while Hildegard was a dental technician. Hildegard eventually married contractor Alvin Massey and the couple lived on the property with her parents in the 1950s. Son Herbert Kuehn, dean of the Methodist Theological Seminary in Singapore, visited his parents often. The Kuehn family owned and occupied the home until Emily Kuehn's death in 1969.

PROPERTY EVALUATION

The 2016 East Austin survey recommends the property as eligible for local landmark designation, individually eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places, and as a contributing structure in potential local and National Register historic districts.

Designation Criteria—Historic Landmark

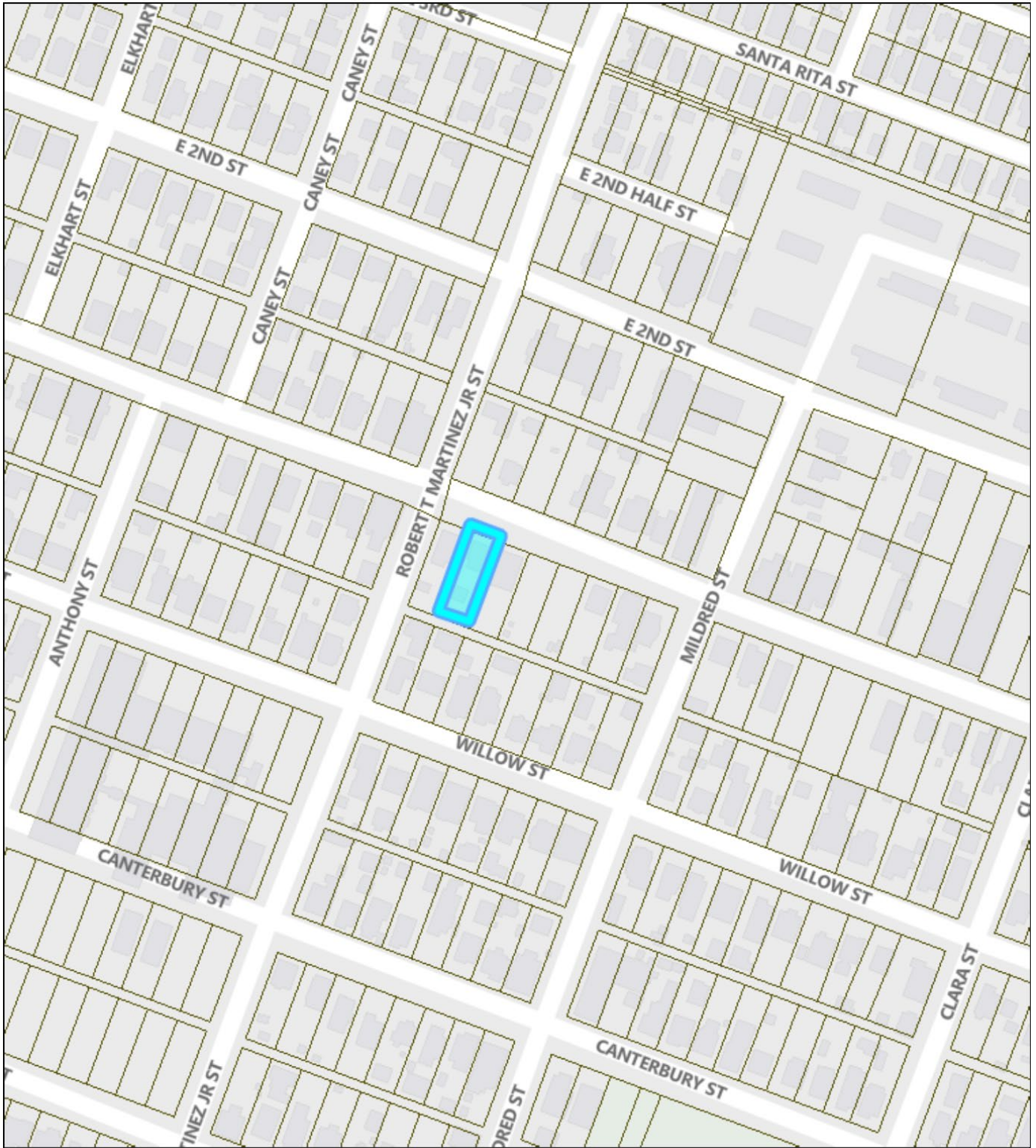
- 1) The building is more than 50 years old.
- 2) The building appears to retain high to moderate integrity. Windows and doors have been replaced.
- 3) Properties must meet two criteria for landmark designation (LDC §25-2-352). The 2016 East Austin Historic Resource Survey recommends that the building meets two criteria:
 - a. Architecture. The building is a good example of a vernacular building constructed with Craftsman and National Folk stylistic influences.
 - b. Historical association. The East Austin Historic Resource Survey recommends the property as eligible for its associations with the widespread development patterns of East Austin.¹ The initial builders and long-term residents of the home exemplify the demographic of middle- and working-class residents of the East Cesar Chavez neighborhood during the twentieth century.
 - c. Archaeology. The property was not evaluated for its potential to yield significant data concerning the human history or prehistory of the region.
 - d. Community value. The property has not been evaluated for its unique location, physical characteristic, or significant feature that contributes to the character, image, or cultural identity of the city, the neighborhood, or a particular demographic group.
 - e. Landscape feature. The property is not a significant natural or designed landscape with artistic, aesthetic, cultural, or historical value to the city.


STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Consider initiation of historic zoning. Should the Commission decide against initiation, encourage adaptive reuse and rehabilitation, then relocation over demolition, but release the demolition permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package.

Sinking of British Warships Paved the Way for Fall Of Singapore, Missionary Fresh From Lost Bastion, Declares

The sinking of the "Repulse" and the "Prince of Wales" came as a staggering blow to the residents of Singapore and foreshadowed in many minds the downfall of Britain's mighty bastion in the Far East, an evacuee from Singapore City declared Saturday.

The Rev. Herbert F. Kuehn, dean of the Methodist Theological college at Singapore, and his wife left Singapore Dec. 21 and arrived in New York Feb. 13. They now are visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Kuehn of 2203 East First street.

As it happened, the Rev. Kuehn

and his wife, who was a teacher in the theological school, were due for a year's furlough and left Singapore voluntarily under that status. Forty-six of their workers, however, were subsequently taken out under evacuation orders and are now presumably in Australia or on the high seas.

The Kuehns experienced a big air raid the day the war with the United States broke out—Dec. 7 at Pearl Harbor but Dec. 8 at Singapore—and there were many "alerts" after that date. The bombing killed many civilians, some of the mis-

siles landing in the Chinatown and Indian sections of the city, and suffering was particularly great among the natives. Up to that time, however, both Europeans and Asiatics had thought Singapore so well defended as to be impregnable, the Rev. Kuehn reported.

The number of defenders was of course a military secret, but it is now placed at 40,000 to 50,000 men. "We thought there were several times that many," the missionary-educator observed, his opinion being the consensus of most civilian residents.

His remarks were not critical—merely an observation on the wide-

spread complacency with which the Far Eastern situation was so long viewed.

The Japanese had advanced a third of the way down Malaya when the Kuehns left on Dec. 21. The "back door sneak" was so swift and so unexpected that the famous coastal guns, facing proudly toward the sea, were hardly fired before Singapore was lost, he commented.

The American couple returned to this country by way of Africa and an Atlantic crossing. A number of wives and children were on the ship, and great fear was felt for passengers' safety, the Rev. Kuehn said.
