[Note: The City of Austin Purchasing Department provided a Certificate of Exemption reflecting that this procurement was exempt from the competitive solicitation based on the criteria that this system is available from only one source because of patents, copyrights, secret process, or natural monopolies. Sole source contracts are exempt from the City Code Chapter 2-9C Minority Owned and Women Owned Business Enterprise Procurement Program; therefore, no subcontracting goals were established.]

SUBJECT: Update to Key Elements of the New Jet-A Fuel Storage Facility

The purpose of this memo is to provide an update to the staff memo from May 12, 2022, regarding key elements related to item 43 on the April 7, 2022, council agenda.

Per the discussion with Council, AUS is committed to limiting the current expansion of the new Jet-A fuel storage facility to the Phase 1 development including two (2) storage tanks at the New Fuel Facility location, unless or until further authorized by Council. Any additional expansion of the Jet-A Fuel storage facility beyond Phase 1, will require a new Environmental Assessment process, which will include robust community engagement and participation by the Airport's Green Team.

AUS is also in the process of exploring any mitigation options for residential properties in close proximity to the New Fuel Facility considering, without prescribing or limitation, possible voluntary property buyouts as appropriate by other than the Airport, available funding, reimbursement sources, proximity, individual site and total costs, regulations and laws, precedents and prioritization. AUS Staff will report back to Council regarding these mitigation options.

SUBJECT: Key Elements of the New Jet-A Fuel Storage Facility

The purpose of this memo is to provide information regarding key elements related to item 43 on the April 7, 2022, council agenda.

Per the discussion with Council, AUS is committed to ensuring that the new Jet-A Fuel Facility will be regulated, monitored and environmentally sound from pre-construction through operation. As a matter of transparency, AUS has publicly posted to the project website, the independent third-party validation of the Environmental Assessment of the new Jet-A Fuel Facility. AUS has also contracted with a third-party vendor, to provide independent monitoring, and auditing of the existing and new Jet-A Fuel Facilities for environmental and safety compliance. This includes installing water quality monitoring equipment at the new facility.

AUS is also in the process of creating an airport "Green Team", with the goal of having this team established in FY23. The team will consist of community volunteer members, business partners, and City Staff, focused on the comprehensive environmental stewardship of the Airport with respect to future phases of airport development and expansion programs, as well as third-party developments on airport property. Along with the "Green Team," AUS will hire a full-time community engagement professional for FY23 to ensure robust community engagement on airport projects going forward.

Additionally, AUS will mitigate visual impacts on the surrounding residential and commercial properties by improving the design of the new facility to include without limitation: screening, landscaping, and use of art in public places.

Information related to the January 19, 2023 Airport Open House presented by Jackie Yaft, Chief Executive Officer. Airport Advisory Commission – Wednesday, Feb. 8, 2023

January 19 – Airport Open House – Verbal Briefing by Jacqueline Yaft

- On January 19 we hosted our first Journey With AUS Airport Open House for neighbors and the traveling public to learn more about Austin-Bergstrom, specifically upcoming and current improvement projects.
- We had 91 attendees sign-in on the sign-in sheets and estimate total attendance to be somewhere between 110 130 people throughout the 2.5 hour event.
- Attendees included representatives from PODER (Poh-Dare), Southeast Austin Neighbors and Residents Organized for Environmental Justice, elected officials, including District 2 Councilmember Vanessa Fuentes and Constable George Morales and community members airport-adjacent neighborhoods.
- 28 surveys were received. Surveys asked attendees:
 - How did they hear about the meeting
 - What did they like most about the event
 - What they would like to see at future events
 - And whether or not they had any additional questions
- We also had interactive stations that asked attendees what questions they had or topics they wanted addressed by the airport
- Our PIO team has collected all the questions, comments and feedback received and has been
 working with the different airport teams to respond. All comments and questions and their
 responses will be shared online in a Meeting Summary Report and we will use the feedback on
 the event to help plan future events.
- We don't have a date selected for our next Open House, but we plan to host one more before the end of the year at a different, off-airport, location.





SUBJECT: FY 2023-24 Budget Process and Calendar

The City remains committed to an inclusive annual budget process. Resident and stakeholder feedback, including the various boards and commissions recommendations, guide City leadership during budget deliberations. The FY 2022-23 budget included recommended investments to conduct Quality of Life studies, expand immigrant legal services, and establish a Trauma Recovery Center. Focused, strategic, one-time investments were made in FY 2022-23 to maintain a balanced financial forecast. It remains crucial to focus recommendations and to provide feedback on the efficiency, equity, and effectiveness of the City's existing services and programs in light of the anticipated financial constraints of the 3.5% tax revenue cap.

The Financial Services Department's Budget and Performance Division will continue to coordinate with City departments to review recommendations passed by boards and commissions. We are requesting that staff or commission liaisons email approved recommendations to BudgetQA@austintexas.gov. The deadline for submitting recommendations is March 31, 2023, allowing staff the necessary time to review the recommendations.

December 2022 Financial Results

Total passenger traffic increased 7.6% in December 2022 compared to December 2021 and 16.8% compared to December 2019. Passenger enplanements totaled 879,932 in December 2022, an increase of 17.8% or 133,249 passengers compared to December 2019 (see below chart). Average daily departures have increased from 186 in December 2019 to 237 in December 2022, an increase of 51 daily departures or 27.4%. Southwest Airlines flight cancellations during the holiday period in December 2022 appears to have influenced AUS enplanements, total passengers and departures for December 2022. Southwest enplaned passengers declined 49k from November 2022.



Table #1 illustrates December 2022's enplanements totaled 879,932 which is 8.8% higher than December 2021, serving an additional 71,025 enplaned passengers. Landing weights totaled 1,069 million pounds in December 2022 representing an

increase of 6.2% compared to December 2021. Cargo volume totaled 12,482 tons in December 2022 representing a decrease of 3.2% compared to December 2021.

Monthly operating revenues increased 11.2% or \$2.1M compared to December 2021. Totaling \$21.2M, December 2022 operating revenues reflect the strong passenger traffic in the month. December 2022 operating revenue is composed of 44.4% airline revenue, 54.8% non-airline revenue, and 0.8% interest income.

Airport operating expenses totaled \$10.6M for the month, an increase of 32.3% or \$2.6M compared to December 2021. The increased operating expenses are the result of higher personnel costs resulting from the 4% across the board pay increase and increase in the living wage to \$20 per hour, higher temporary employee and overtime expenses in response to higher passenger traffic, and increased contractual costs including parking services and consulting contracts. Additionally, in the month of December annual gainsharing and service incentive payments were distributed to qualifying employees. AUS reported a \$4.7M surplus (before federal relief funding) in December 2022 compared to a surplus of \$5.6M in December 2021.

Fiscal Year 2023 Financial Results

Through the third month of Fiscal Year 2023 (FY2023), AUS delivered strong financial performance when compared to the same period in Fiscal Year 2022 (FY2022). FY2023 Year to Date (YTD) Operating Revenue totals \$67.8M compared to \$57.9M in FY2022, a 17.2% increase. Airport Operating Expenses totaled \$27.3M YTD in FY2023 compared to \$23.7M in FY2022, a 15.3% increase. Net income before federal relief funding totals \$22.8M YTD in FY2023 compared to \$18.5M in FY2022, an increase of 23.7% or \$4.4M.

Through December 2022 AUS delivered favorable YTD financial performance compared to FY2023 budget on a seasonalized basis due to increased revenue and operating expense savings. As presented in Table #2, FY2023 revenues exceed budgeted revenues by 18.9% or \$10.8M. The increased revenues are the result of passenger traffic in the month that exceeds forecasts used to develop the budget. Airport operating expenses are 11.5% or \$3.5M below budgeted expenses due primarily to higher than budgeted personnel vacancy rates. Before federal relief funding application, AUS reports net income of \$22.8M, which exceeds the seasonalized budget estimate by \$14.3M.





Highlights of recent air service announcements/developments include:

- Air Canada YYZ reverted to 1x on Nov. 1 with 76-seat RJ and upgauge to A220-300 (137 seats) on May 1; AC suspended YVR for Oct-April and will return 2/wk on May 1
- Alaska dropped all planned PSP service and discontinued LAX eff. Jan. 10; BOI returns on June 15
- Allegiant has discontinued service to ABQ, AMA, PBI, PGD, SGF & TUL; IND resumed in March, MEM suspended Nov onwards; 17 markets will be served Summer 2023
- American will serve EGE, PSP, & RSW this Winter; IAD suspended Jan-Apr; MEM service started on Jan 10; PSP will be served daily Jan-Apr; SJU discontinued in Nov; SJD now served daily; RSW service will not start until February due to Hurricane Ian; weekly service to ECP starts on Feb. 4; seasonal service to VPS resumes on Feb. 4 and loaded through summer, will increase to daily for June-August; SMF daily service starts May 5; CZM suspended Aug. 12 Oct. 7; added three AGS roundtrips in April for Masters Tournament
- **JetBlue** has indefinitely suspended EWR & LAX service, FLL will return on June 15, BOS will only be 1x for June 15 Sept. 5 with the A220-300
- KLM started AMS service on March 28, 2022 with three weekly flights
- **Lufthansa** reinstated FRA service on April 8, 2022 with three weekly flights; A340-300 (279 seat) is loaded starting May 2 (+24 seats v. A330-300)
- Southwest will serve BOS, MTJ, PIT & SRQ this Winter season; CHS, CZM, ECP, & PVR resume in March;
 VPS resumes in June
- Spirit started new daily service to MTY on October 5, reduced to 4/wk starting in Jan; increased MCO from 1x→2x starting in Jan; MIA service will be suspended Feb. 8 April 4; BWI service starts on Feb. 8; DTW will return on Feb. 8 and CUN will be return on April 5
- Virgin Atlantic started nonstop service to London (Heathrow) on May 25 with four weekly flights; daily service is scheduled for May 1-July 10 and then again from Sept. 6


