Old Administration Building is located on the historic, Huston-Tillotson University Campus. HT serves a diverse population which ranges from various ethnic groups to minority serving. Our dedication to diversity and community engagement is branded in our University mission- To provide opportunities to a diverse population for academic achievement with an emphasis on academic excellence, spiritual and ethical development, civic engagement, and leadership in a nurturing environment. HT is dedicated to the historically underserved and responds to this priority by providing educational services to predominately minorities and low-income students. HT embraces history as a noted and well-known HBCU. HT provide academic programs that ranges from Teacher Preparation, History, Environmental Justice, and Music to African American Studies.

Through this restoration project, HT will be able to strengthen its preserve its historical structure, the Old Administration Building. This project which will provide improvements to this structure by stabilizing the wooden floors that are made from special oak trees dating back to over130 years. Additional restorations will include restoring the patterned ceilings, restoring the inner and outer stair casings, and restoring two bathrooms. The success of these projects will provide safety and functionality of the structure while keeping its original designs and materials.

This structure has noteworthy historical features such as the freestanding cast-iron columns and much pressed-tin decorative ceilings. The siting of the structure on the side of a hill is dramatic, and the sense of vertically, which is implied by the setting and design is reinforced by the presence of tall cedars placed near the two main entrances. This site has historical significance to the African American community, the City of Austin, the history, and relevance of HBCUs, University partners, tourists, and students. Current Use: The Old Administration Building is currently used as an administration building and will continue to serve as a Historically Preserved Visitor's Center for the City of Austin. Our heaviest traffic is during Spring, out of state visitors frequent during this time. OAB is one of the six destinations listed on the Austin Historic Tour. The availability Huston-Tillotson University 4 of the tours is during normal working hours of 8:30 am to 5:30 pm for walk-in traffic. Tours are also scheduled for after hours and on weekends by contacting the University. Many of our tours are provided by our University Ambassadors. Our student groups are well trained on the history and culture of the University.

We plan to enhance and increase participation and access to our visitors by listing the site with a summary and possible virtual tour on our website soon. As a hub for tremendous traffic on the weekends as state and national events are held that brings hundreds and thousands of visitors to our campus, we see opportunity in marketing our tours to these groups through the Community and Civic Engagement Office when they make their applications. We plan to develop an OCR Code that can be used by potential visitors online to preview the site for more information. While reduced by the COVID-19 Pandemic, tourism of Huston-Tillotson University Historic sites was steady during early Spring 2020 academic semester. The Old Administration Building is on the historic registry as a Historically Preserved site.






All materials will be repurposed. Any additional materials that may be needed will be matched to the existing materials.




If the requested award amount is not granted, we will prioritize this project by completing the most urgent restorations that are safety issues. We will also seek additional funding from other grant opportunities.


































HT embraces history as a noted and well-known HBCU. HT provide academic programs that preserves our historical heritage which includes but not limited to Teacher Preparation, History, Environmental Justice, Music, and African American Studies. Huston-Tillotson University is a historic site that hosts over 3,500 visitors each year. Our site is used to host public and private events. It is our goal to preserve our structures so that that will remain functional and will be accessible for years to come.

Industry Background

Huston-Tillotson University is a private HBCU located in Austin, Texas. HT serves a diverse population, which covers various ethnic groups. Huston—Tillotson University's campus is located at the site of the former Tillotson College on a land feature formerly known to residents as Bluebonnet Hill. The 24-acre (9.7 ha) campus is located in East Austin, between 7th and 11th streets near I-35 and downtown Austin. East Austin has historically been the city's designated place for African American culture and empowerment largely due to Jim Crow laws. Most of the buildings on campus follow the same nomenclature as the name of the university, with hyphens denoting the importance of the contributions of individuals from both colleges before the merger.
