Posting Language

Authorize negotiation and execution of a contract for a scenario-based simulator with VirTra, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$160,215.

Additional Backup Information:

The contract is for the purchase of a scenario-based training simulator for use by the Austin Police Department Training Academy. The system provides a training platform for officers to develop knowledge in the successful navigation of varied simulated experiences through the use of appropriate command presence, communication skills, and decision-making strategies. The system utilizes a library of interactive and immersive scenarios in areas to include hostage situations, active threat/active shooter, mental health response, and de-escalation techniques.

The United States General Services Administration cooperative establishes competitively bid contracts that can be utilized by the State and other government agencies through a cooperative agreement. Cooperative agreements save taxpayer dollars by leveraging the State's volume-buying power to drive down costs on hundreds of contracts through a streamlined cooperative purchasing program.

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If the City is unable to complete this purchase, it may result in the loss of grant funding to purchase the equipment.
