2	WHEREAS, before COVID, about 20% of the Travis County jail
3	population were identified as having a serious mental health condition and now
4	about 41%, representing 880 inmates, are identified as having a serious mental
5	health condition; and
6	WHEREAS, approximately 75% of all arrests were for misdemeanors, often
7	for nonviolent, mental health-related disorder behaviors; and
8	WHEREAS, in May 2022, the Travis County Commissioners Court
9	partnered with Dell Medical School for the Travis County Forensic Mental Health
.0	Project to find solutions for those in Travis County jails in need of care for mental
.1	health or substance use issues; and
.2	WHEREAS, the project incorporated lead stakeholders, including people
.3	with lived experiences, mental health and legal experts, judicial leaders, and law
.4	enforcement and community advocates in a 10-month solution-driven process to
.5	create actionable recommendations to address these complex issues; and
.6	WHEREAS, the report estimated between 64 and 136 people might be
.7	eligible for diversion every month and recommended a facility able to
.8	accommodate anywhere from 32 to 70 beds; and
.9	WHEREAS, increasing diversion efforts could not only help with the
20	growing population at the local jail, but could help with the long waitlist at the
21	state hospital that is used to restore competency for people who are involved in the
2	criminal justice system: and

WHEREAS, the Texas Commission on Mental Health and Texas Health 23 and Human Services Commission released an "Eliminate the Wait" toolkit that 24 noted over the past two decades, there has been a 38% increase in the number of 25 26 people found incompetent to stand trial; and **WHEREAS**, the competency restoration service is a temporary and 27 28 narrowly focused rehabilitation effort that does not create a treatment plan for long-term recovery and rejoining the community; and 29 WHEREAS, the process is inefficient, and people found incompetent to 30 stand trial may be restored and return to jail, only to mentally deteriorate again 31 before their case concludes; and 32 WHEREAS, county and city officials, working with other community 33 partners, play a critical role in funding, implementing, and coordinating a local 34 continuum of care to support people in mental health and substance use disorder 35 crises; and 36 WHEREAS, Council adopted Resolution No. 20210729-174 stating its 37 interest in and support of Travis County's initiative to study the opportunities of a 38 mental health diversion pilot program with the Austin/Travis County Sobering 39 Center (Sobering Center); and 40 WHEREAS, Council adopted Resolution No. 20190620-184, which 41 included direction to the City Manager to expand existing models of non-42 criminalized connection to services by first responders, such as the Sobering 43 Center and Downtown Austin Community Court, in addition to exploring the use 44 of Houston's mental health jail diversion models of non-criminalized connection to 45

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services by first responders; and

47	WHEREAS, Expanded Mobile Crisis Outreach Team (EMCOT) was
48	established in 2013 and provides the crisis services and crisis relapse prevention
49	services array through first responders dispatches and requests for services; and
50	WHEREAS, from 2015 to 2018, all Austin Police Department calls for
51	service that included EMCOT engagement yielded jail diversion rates at 98% or
52	99%, emergency detention diversion from 88% to 93%, and hospital diversion
53	rates from 76% to 81% when Emergency Medical Services engaged EMCOT; and
54	WHEREAS, Integral Care, Travis County's local mental health authority,
55	operates The Inn, a 16-bed facility that provides short-term crisis support for up to
56	seven days for adults recovering from a mental health crisis; and
57	WHEREAS, The Inn saved the local health care system between \$1.87
58	million and \$2.82 million annually from 2017 to 2019 when compared with the
59	same treatment and length of stay in a hospital setting; and
60	WHEREAS, on March 21, 2023, Travis County passed a resolution to
61	implement the recommendations from the forensic mental health project conducted
62	by Dell Medical School which includes the creation of a Travis County Diversion
63	Center; and
64	WHEREAS, Travis County's resolution seeks to identify funding options,
65	including through partnerships with the Travis County Hospital District, Central
66	Health, CommUnity Care, Integral Care, City, and state and federal partners, and
67	directs staff to report back to the Travis County Commissioners Court within 180
68	days; and

69	WHEREAS, Travis County's resolution directs staff to provide
70	recommendations for a program design that will inform the design and
71	construction of the Diversion Center within 120 days; and
72	WHEREAS, on April 20, 2023, the Travis County Commissioners Court
73	will allocate Travis County's remaining Local Fiscal Recovery Funds; NOW,
74	THEREFORE,
75	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AUSTIN:
76	The City Manager is directed to explore the feasibility of an interlocal
77	agreement with Travis County, Integral Care, and the Austin/Travis County
78	Sobriety Center Local Government Corporation for the development of a new
79	Austin/Travis County Diversion Center that includes requirements for governance
80	and sustainable funding.
81	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:
82	The City Manager is directed to work with Travis County and Integral Care
83	to identify the financial resources necessary to partner in developing a pilot for
84	mental health diversion services and a bridge housing program.

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:

The City Manager is directed to provide regular updates to the Public Health
Committee and provide a report to Council regarding the status of these
directives by September 1, 2023.
