

Resolution No. 20211104-39

- Initiated code amendments to address dangerous fence design including spiked elements that protrude above the top horizontal bar of a fence
- Resolution found that City Code currently allows some spiked fence styles that can pose significant risk to humans and animals
- Directed the City Manager to evaluate:
 - ☐ Requiring flat top styles on new fences of all lengths
 - ☐ Applying flat top fence requirements to all new fences of six feet tall or lower
 - □ Applying flat top fence requirements to substantial fence repairs or remodeling of 50% or more of an existing fence





Early Engagement Series (April-June 2022)

- Goal was to gather feedback

Final Engagement Series (January – February 2023)

- Goal is to gather feedback on final draft of the code amendment

Proposed Ordinance

• We are incorporating all Fence Requirements into one code section, LDC 25-2-899, by deleting an existing section of LDC 9-4-41 and adding to 25-2-899 and also adding safe fence requirements as outlined in the draft Ordinance. We are not making any modifications to 25-2-899 as it exists.









- Proposal includes prohibition of the following features in all new fences six feet in height or less:
 - ☐ Spiked pickets, spiked bars or other spiked decorative elements above the top horizontal backer rail
 - □ Vertical picket spacing between 2 9 inches above the top horizonal backer rail
- Fences that create a substantial risk of entrapment or impalement as determined by the City also prohibited









- Proposed **exemptions**:
 - ☐ Fences over six feet in height
 - ☐ Fences classified as historic by the Historic Landmark Commission








Fences used as pool barriers shall comply with Chapter 25-12, Art. 14









































