Climate Resilient Maricopa Regional Infrastructure Exchange

Context There is readiness for regional collaboration on climate change.

An array of partners are expressing a shared interest in mobilizing regional coordination on climate change. Taking a phased approach, work and momentum towards a 10-year vision and agenda.

Opportunity Advance climate resilient infrastructure with federal funding.

Preparing for and mobilizing around federal infrastructure funding has been identified as a top priority among regional stakeholders.

- The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) presents an opportunity to pursue and deploy resources to advance climate resilience. A first round of federal program applications will launch in Q1 2022, and on a rolling basis from there.
- Many competitive grant programs require and/or will preference regional scale planning and implementation. They are expected to be very competitive and entail intensive application processes.
- Local governments and their partners will need to work together to develop plans and projects.
 Local governments will also need to work with the state and federal governments to apply for grants and access funding.
- Cities, tribes, and MAG have begun to prepare for the influx of federal funding.

The Regional Infrastructure Exchange will bring specific focus to the climate equity opportunities within the IIJA and to facilitate regional collaboration - encouraging multi-city applications and supporting cities and the County in proposal development.

2022 Goals:

- → Convene regional partners to review federal funding opportunities and requirements
- → Identify opportunities for multi-city and public-private partnership proposals
- → Develop guiding principles for grant applications
- → Ensure participation of CBOs and local tribes
- → Generate multi-city, multi-sector federal funding proposals

Structure Establish a cross-sector strategy team.

An informal cross sector, cross jurisdictional strategy team will meet monthly throughout 2022 to guide the direction and development of the emergent regional climate coordination initiative. Members will rotate chairing meetings and will include others from their organizations as able and needed.

Staffing: The City of Tempe's Office of Sustainability will provide initial staff support, with Brianne Fisher serving in a project management role.

2022 Focus Areas

Three focus areas have been identified for a first phase of work in 2022:

1. Regional Government Collaboration and Capacity Building

Facilitate learning and coordination between cities, non-profits, CBOs and the business community.

Next Step:

Develop a series of expert-led workshops, co-hosted amongst different partners, to identify federal funding opportunities, review program requirements, and discuss strategies for successful grant submissions.

Outcomes:

- Establish philanthropic and federal grants guidelines for the region to use as a resource for coordination on grant applications.
- Identify priority projects and opportunities.

2. Community Partnerships and Capacity Building

Facilitate dialogue and collaboration between cities and CBOs.

Next Step:

Establish formal partnership and working group with Community Based Organization (CBO) to define scope of needs and opportunities.

Outcomes:

- Partnership principles work; Establish shared principles that guide partnerships between cities and CBOs.
- Launch a mini-grant program, supported with a first round of funding from Vitalyst and jointly managed by CHISPA and Unlimited Potential, to fund communityled climate projects.

3. Business Community Engagement and Cross-Sector Integration

Engage the business community and develop the economic framework of climate action.


Next Step:

- Identify private-public grant partnership opportunities
- Identify and leverage business support for priority projects and grant applications
- Explore economic impact analysis
