## **CITY OF AUSTIN**





- Over 700 trees have been planted on the JJ&T tract of the BCP and watering and forest restoration workdays have continued on the Vireo Preserve.
- We've continued our Wild Neighbors Speaker Series, in conjunction with Travis County and talked to neighbors about possums and the history of the Christmas Bird Count.
- Guided hikes continued on Cortana, Bright Leaf, Kent Butler, and Long Canyon Tracts. There was a collaborative hike done with Latino Outdoors Austin in December at Bright Leaf.
- In November, we gathered with volunteers at our Onion property for a volunteer appreciation lunch. Prior to the lunch, volunteers had to option to join in on either a guided hike or cave tour.

#### **BAKER SANCTUARY (TRAVIS AUDUBON)**



- A hardy band of intrepid volunteers came together in December to rid the Canyon Trail of the last remnants of the ice storm known as Uri. While the trail had been cleared months prior by the resident land manager, many piles of interlocked, stubborn, and generally unpleasant piles of slash remained to be dispersed throughout the woodland. By disseminating the brush away from the trail, the mellow aesthetic of the area was restored, not to mention it also reduced the likelihood of a hiker encountering a snake which may have been attracted to a pile in their ceaseless search for quivering, musky rodents.
- Nicholas Melendrez, with help from Boy Scout Troop 410, installed two additional trail benches on the Baker Spring Trail. Unfortunately, in the process he discovered a large, nearly impenetrable bench of limestone lurking a mere six inched beneath the placid soil. Moving the benches was not an option, so with the pluck we have come to expect from the Scouts, he and his troop spent several grueling hours ever so slowly chipping their way through the rock until the appropriate depth was achieved. One can only hope that future loungers on the benches sense their sacrifice.

## **TRAVIS COUNTY**





- In November Travis County BCP participated in the Fall It's My Park Day Event (pictured left) Volunteers spent time removing invasive vinca from the preserve while learning about the BCP, its endangered species and mission.
   We have participated in both the spring and fall events for a few years and always look forward to them.
- We hosted several corporate groups in Q1 including Red Hat and Deloitte (pictured right). These corporate events combine an active project such as removing invasive plants and a guided hike to learn about the BCP.
- On a very rainy day in November 28 seniors from Jarrell High School visited the preserve to volunteer removing invasive plants, go on an educational nature hike, and participate in a BCP 101 presentation. The rain did not dampen spirts and the students removed a lot of common periwinkle and wisteria.

#### WESTCAVE PRESERVE





- The end-of-the-year cold shock turned the Grotto at Westcave into an icicle winter wonderland that board member Matthew Guthrie was able to experience and capture. For the fall field trip season, Westcave had a total of 16 field trips serving 598 students who participated in Environmental Justice discussions to learn that people do not all have the same accessibility to nature, but everyone deserves to live on a clean and healthy earth. In pre/post surveys we found an increase in students' reported mood and desire to join an environmental career after the program.
- Jenny McMillan is a recent addition to the Westcave staff as our new Executive Director starting in August. Over the years Jenny has found joy, peace and spiritual restoration in nature. Growing up, she enjoyed making mud pies with her sisters and later developed a love of hiking and camping. #### **WILD BASIN**





- Artist in Residence: Fall Artist In Residence, Ania Safko, interacted
  with weekend guests on the trails. In November, she led a youth
  and an adult ceramics workshop. In a December reception, Ania
  displayed her ceramic work and recited a written piece about the
  preserve and drought.
- Schools Return: After over two years of no school visits, due to the pandemic, school field trips restarted in the fall. One teacher shared that it was some of the students' first field trip.
- New Interpretive Signs:Staff and volunteers installed the preserve's first permanent interpretive signs along the Arroyo Vista Loop. These new signs are used by both self-guided hikers and guided programs. Signs include illustrations and interpretive information in English and Spanish. A QR code linking the visitor with an audio version of the text will be added soon.
- Retreat, Hike and Service: The St. Edward's Marketing
  Department came to Wild Basin for a staff retreat, which included
  a guided hike and a service project restoring some of the
  weathered outdoor furniture.

#### **CITY OF AUSTIN**





- Prior to Golden-cheeked Warbler season, we had four invasive privet pulling workdays on the Long Canyon tract, which is part of a long-term invasive control method.
- Tree Planting and Nursery workdays at the JJ&T tract and Forest Restoration workdays at Vireo have successfully continued, with tree planting season wrapping up at the end of March.
- We've continued our Wild Neighbors Speaker Series, in conjunction with Travis County. Presentation topics included Texas groundwater fauna and native plants and pollinators.
- We continued guided hikes, which took place on Kent Butler, Sam Hamilton, Bright Leaf, and Long Canyon tracts.
- Golden-cheeked Warbler season is in full swing and so are surveys. Biologists and volunteer resighters are seeing banded returning birds and nest-building.
   Our volunteer resighters consist of 70 people and, so far, they're completed approximately 515 survey hours and counting.

#### **BAKER SANCTUARY (TRAVIS AUDUBON)**





- A special workday was convened to deal with tree damage from Ice Storm Uri of 2021 fame. The plan was to begin the long process of cleaning out the shaded fuel break with the assistance of volunteers with chainsaws. As it turns out, Ice Storm Mara rolled in, so volunteers were redirected to cleaning up the public space around the JAEC.
- Bryce Gilley, with assistance from Boy Scout Troop 234, installed two new trail benches as part of his Eagle Scout project. They were originally planned to be situated on the northern Sanctuary but, due to Mara and the resultant destruction, they were instead installed on the southern Sanctuary where some trail had been laboriously cleared.
- Once again, GCWA monitoring season has arrived and the birds are reluctantly ready to be monitored. A dedicated group of monitors struggled through Uri's destruction of the study plot, climbing through deadfalls, dodging tumbling widow makers, and re-routing around massive walls of tangled trees, all to glimpse the shiny legs of warblers. After a year of work, the plot was cleared and the monitors were excited to return, but, alas, Mara arrived and now the plot is arguably worse than it was from Uri. However, the monitors persevere and dream of better days to come.

#### **TRAVIS COUNTY**





- In a mad rush before Golden-cheeked warbler nesting season, volunteers spent significant time in Q2 cleaning up after winter storm Mara. They assisted with clearing roads and trails and chipping debris at several Travis County tracts.
- A special celebration occurred during a Snowden Wednesday workday in March when we celebrated long-time volunteer Yates Barreda's (pictured left) 10th anniversary volunteering with Travis County BCP and her 80<sup>th</sup> birthday. Yates has clocked in over 1,846 hours volunteering since 2013! She has been instrumental in establishing the Snowden teaching gardens and is a valued asset to our program.
- We were happy to welcome Westlake High School Seniors (pictured right) again as
  part of the Seniors Day of Service Project. The students planted 30 trees of various
  sizes on the Snowden tract. After the planting festivities, they went on a short 1.3mile hike to learn about the BCP, our protected species, and the importance of
  conservation.

#### **WESTCAVE PRESERVE**





- Westcave kicked off their field trip Spring Season welcoming 708 students in February and March on 15 field trip days to the lush, beautiful Grotto as Red Wild Columbine and fiddle ferns.
- Westcave also hosted the Girls Outside Program, a program providing 320 K-12 girls from 10 Austin ISD schools with opportunities to learn and grow together through time in nature.
- Golden-cheeked warblers officially returned March 9th at Westcave. "Fluffy", a male banded in 2022 has been confirmed on the property. So far during the 2023 season, 3 males have been noted to occupy a territory.

#### **WILD BASIN**





- Senior Service Day: In March a group of 13 seniors and 2 teachers from Westlake High School selected Wild Basin for their senior day of service. They removed 17 large bags of loose trash and other large debris between the western property line and Highway 360.
- Speaker and Social Series Started: On Feb. 28th, Wild Basin's Research Director, Darren Proppe PhD, gave a public presentation about ongoing research at Wild Basin, with the topic "Urbanization Drives Changes in Wild Basin Preserve." On March 28th, City of Austin Wildlife Officer, Emery Sadkin, presented about Peacefully Coexisting with Coyotes. A new speaker is being planned for each month.
- Wild X Wild Basin: During the week of Spring Break, Wild Basin provided family friendly weekday events that included guided hikes, a bird talk and walk with Travis Audubon volunteers, a fossil touch table with the Paleontological Society of Austin, and a few tree cookie crafts.
- Eagle Scout Project: An Eagle Scout candidate has been working to replace and upgrade the bird blind on North Hollow's retention pond. Work started early in February and is expected to be completed by mid-April. A lot of material harvested from tree damage during winter storm Mara is being incorporated into the project.
