Additional Backup Information:

The contract is for the purchase of a walk-in freezer and installation services for the Forensic Science Department, Evidence Unit. The Evidence Unit is responsible for the secure storage of evidence in the department's possession. This equipment will primarily store DNA evidence seized or collected by the Austin Police Department. Existing freezer storage in the evidence warehouse is near maximum capacity and this equipment will increase the department's allotted space to store future DNA evidence.

The Texas Association of School Boards, Inc. (BuyBoard) cooperative is a cooperative purchasing association recognized under Texas procurement statutes. Cooperative associations, themselves or using a lead government, competitively solicit and award contracts that are eligible for use by other qualified state and local governments. Due to their substantial volumes, larger than any one government could achieve independently, cooperative contracts routinely include superior terms, conditions, and pricing. Use of cooperative contracts also results in lower administrative costs and time savings.

This is a new contract. If the City is unable to secure a contract, the City may lose its capacity to store future DNA evidence. The inability to provide proper storage could place DNA evidence at risk of degradation and jeopardize the integrity of the criminal justice process.
