
Water Supplies

City of Austin has access to water supplies of up to 325,000 acre-feet per year

Municipal supply comes from a combination of:

- City of Austin senior water rights (run-of-river)
- Water supply contracts with LCRA (providing firm water and firm back-up to Run of River rights)


Highland Lakes Inflows



Water conditions

This week's drought map shows that rainfall from Tropical Storm Harold remnants brought one to two categories of drought improvement to parts of South Texas. While other parts of the state saw continued degradation, the overall area of the state impacted by drought decreased for the first time in 11 weeks.


Drought conditions

- ♦ 76% a year ago






NOAA 3-Month Outlook: Aug - Oct



The seasonal outlooks combine long-term trends, soil moisture, and El Nino/Southern Oscillation. El Niño is anticipated to continue through the Northern Hemisphere winter (with greater than 95% chance through December 2023 -February 2024).

Ongoing Activities

Monitoring

- Continued monitoring of Highland Lakes inflows, combined storage levels, forecasted weather conditions, and climate patterns
- Ongoing coordination with the Lower Colorado River Authority (LCRA) through our Water Partnership

Planning

- AW updating the Water Forward plan, with anticipated completion in 2024
- AW involved in the Region K water supply planning process

Implementation

- Water Forward conservation and reuse strategies
- Aquifer Storage and Recovery pilot project
- Indirect Potable Reuse preliminary planning

Stage 2 Drought Restrictions

- Landscape watering
 - Automatic irrigation
 - 1x per week (Wed/Thur)
 - Midnight **5:00 am**, 7:00 pm midnight
 - Hose-end sprinklers
 - 1x per week (Sat/Sun)
 - Midnight 10:00 am, 7:00 pm midnight
 - Increased enforcement patrols and investigations

- Ornamental fountains >4" are prohibited
- Golf course fairways irrigated1x per week
- Charity car washes not allowed
- Landscape establishment is no longer exempt from watering schedule
