# HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION DEMOLITION AND RELOCATION PERMITS OCTOBER 4, 2023 PR-2023-116387; GF-2023-118718 4604 CRESTWAY DRIVE

#### **PROPOSAL**

Demolish a ca. 1957 house.

#### **ARCHITECTURE**

The house at 4604 Crestway Drive is one and one-half stories in height, with a low-slope roof and deep eaves. It is clad in natural stone and vertical cedar siding. Fenestration includes aluminum ribbon and half-height sliders, full-height sliders, and full-height fixed windows. A first-floor carport, wide chimney, and stone retaining walls visually anchor the house to the hillside on which it is built.

#### RESEARCH

4604 Crestway Drive was built in 1957 by Richard R. Hidell, Sr. Hidell, son of a Fort Worth hardware company founder, opened Hidell Builders Supply in Austin in the late 1940s. Though Hidell, Sr. retired in 1996, the company is still around today and supplies materials to contractors around the state.

Hidell was active in several charitable organizations, serving in leadership positions in numerous clubs. During the 1960s, he served as an officer of the Westwood Country Club alongside architect Roland G. Roessner, a luminary of Austin's Midcentury Modern design community. Though no evidence was found linking Roessner to 4604 Crestway, he designed several homes—including his own at 3414 Foothill Terrace<sup>1</sup>—in and around the Balcones Park and Mount Bonnell areas, including the house at 4504 Crestway in 1965.<sup>2</sup> Additionally, 4604 Crestway's design is reminiscent of the 1957 Roessner home formerly located at 3800 Balcones Drive, with a similar prominent chimney and wide, shallow eaves. <sup>3</sup>

## PROPERTY EVALUATION

Designation Criteria—Historic Landmark

- 1) The building is more than 50 years old.
- 2) The building appears to retain high integrity.
- 3) Properties must meet two criteria for landmark designation (LDC §25-2-352). The property does not appear to meet two criteria:
  - a. Architecture. The building is a good example of mid-century Modern design, using natural materials and employing a design that responds to the site's topography. Its details are reminiscent of a Roland G. Roessner design, though no connection has been confirmed to date.
  - b. Historical association. The property does not appear to have significant historical associations, though the Commission may wish to consider the relationship between Hidell Builders' Supply and the home's unique materials and construction.
  - c. Archaeology. The property was not evaluated for its potential to yield significant data concerning the human history or prehistory of the region.
  - d. Community value. The property does not appear to possess a unique location, physical characteristic, or significant feature that contributes to the character, image, or cultural identity of the city, the neighborhood, or a particular demographic group.
  - e. Landscape feature. The property was not evaluated as a significant natural or designed landscape with artistic, aesthetic, cultural, or historical value to the city.

### STAFF RECOMMENDATION


Strongly encourage rehabilitation and adaptive reuse, then deconstruction and reuse of materials, but release the demolition permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package.

## Tennis Courts Contract Let



Richard Robinson "Dick" Hidell, also affectionately known to many as "Pop", passed away peacefully April 21, 2009 at the age of 88, in the comfort of his own bed. He was born in Ft. Worth, Texas on December 2, 1920. He led a full and successful life. Dick graduated from Woodrow Wilson High School and then graduated from Texas A&M University in 1943. He was a member of the Century Club as well as the Reveille Club and was a lifelong fan of the Texas A&M football team. He was preceded in death by his parents, his brother Williams H. Hidell, Jr. and his wife, Charles Curfman Hidell. He is survived by his present wife, Mary Epperson Hidell, his son, Richard R. "Rick" Hidell, Jr., sister Marie Hidell Finley, granddaughters Jacqueline M. Hidell, Vanessa Hidell Golden, and two great-grandchildren, as well as Mary's daughters, Laura Syler and Amy Curl.
