Community Technology & Telecommunications Commission (CTTC)

The Board/Commission mission statement (per the City Code) is:

§ 2-1-107 - COMMUNITY TECHNOLOGY AND TELECOMMUNICATIONS COMMISSION.

(A) The Community Technology and Telecommunications Commission membership should be broadly representative of community interests. A commissioner should have resided continuously within the City for not less than 180 days.

(B) In this section:

- (1) Information and communications technology includes digital devices, networks, and software that allow people to create, access, store, transmit, and manipulate information.
- (2) Community technology includes information, communications technology training, and access that promotes civic and cultural participation, employment, and life-long learning.
- (3) Telecommunications services include all transmission of voice, data, or video by means of permanent facilities installed in the City's rights-of-way or by means of radio transmission.
- (C) The commission shall advise the city council regarding issues that include:
 - (1) Community technology;
 - (2) Telecommunications services;
 - (3) New sources of funding for access television projects;

- (4) New sources of funding for community technology projects;
- (5) Allocation of annual financial support;
- (6) The evaluation of the performance of access television contractors and other community technology contractors, including development of criteria to be used for evaluations; and
- (7) Information and communications technology facilities and services that are operated by the City for public use, including the City web site, Internet services and open government technologies.
- (D) The commission shall conduct public hearings regarding issues that include:
 - (1) The performance of access television contractors and other community technology contractors; and
 - (2) The identification of community cable, telecommunications, and technology needs.
- (E) The commission shall promote access to telecommunications services and community technologies by methods including:
 - (1) Public awareness, use, and viewership of access television programming and other community media;
 - (2) Identifying community technology needs and problems in the City and defining innovative programming approaches to those needs and problems, and
 - (3) Public awareness of telecommunications policy and community technology issues.
- (F) The commission shall serve as a coordinating forum for issues relating to the provision of every different type of telecommunications services and community technologies, by receiving reports and recommendations from other City boards and commissions and from City departments and forwarding these to the city council.
- (G) The commission does not possess any sovereign authority regarding any cable television or cable related telecommunications issue, and the commission serves in an advisory capacity only.
- (H) The Commission may create a Grant Review Committee consisting of up to seven members to review grant applications, conduct interviews, and evaluate applications for the purpose of providing recommendations to the Commission for grant awards under the City's Grant for Technology Opportunities program. The Commission may appoint persons to the Grant Review Committee who are not members of the Commission, but must appoint one member of the Commission to the Grant Review Committee who shall serve as ex-officio chair of the Grant Review Committee. All members of the Grant Review Committee are subject to Article 4 of Chapter 2-7 of the Code (Code of Ethics).

Current Objectives

Objectives (Order does not reflect prioritization): (All Strategic Outcomes Reflected)

- 1. Investigate ways to enable the homeless population using a digital matching program i.e. job matching, programs etc.
 - a. Historical: Small conversations about the role played by local nonprofits and DECA partner solutions without much follow-up. Digital Kiosks were discussed as something to pursue. Must leverage key learnings from existing use cases (e.g. convention center, cap metro, airport, City Hall, etc...). Hosted Diana Grey Chief Homelessness Strategy Officer at a WG meeting and she presented to this WG on the "Homelessness Response System" We also hosted a Town Hall at Terrazas Branch library in 10/2022 wherein the outreach process to get participants led us to the Austin Homelessness Advisory Committee (AHAC) meeting and connected us with Laura Williamson.

On 7/11/2022 a "Community Showcase: Capacity Building Initiative" was hosted at City Hall featuring a cohort of 21 nonprofit service providers who were selected to receive technical assistance and grants up to \$45k, all as part of the City's commitment to "expanding services, improving equity, and supporting minority-led organizations within the Homelessness Response System."

b. Next Steps: Request an update related to the Homelessness Services Organizational Capacity Building Initiative, born from coordination between the Homelessness Strategy Division and Innovation Office, in collaboration with Blue Sky Partners. On 7/11/2022 a "Community Showcase: Capacity Building Initiative" was hosted at City Hall featuring a cohort of 21 nonprofit service providers who were selected to receive technical assistance and grants up to \$45k, all as part of the City's commitment to "expanding services, improving equity, and supporting minority-led organizations within the Homelessness Response System.

Request a WG briefing on the City of Austin Homeless Encampment Management (HEM) - The Homeless Encampment Management Team provides a coordinated, cross-departmental City response to encampments that prioritizes the health and safety of all Austinites and strives to preserve human dignity and respect. Resources and tools to support citywide homeless encampment efforts are centralized on a Sharepoint page, with public group acces.

- Increase CTTC relationships/partnerships with local technology companies (AT&T, Google, etc.) with the goal of identifying opportunities to expand both access and upskilling/education including the development of broadband standards for minimum acceptable speeds in households, particularly for communities of color.
 - a. Historical: We have open communication lines with a history of more frequent presentations from Carriers on changes impacting the community, such as the Affordability Connectivity Programs and community-oriented programs.

Pursuant to CTTC Work Plan the CTTC has committed to hosting a Digital Inclusion Stakeholder Summit in coordination with DECA partners that would include local tech companies, both as a focused part of the content with the Digital Inclusion Ecosystem. In 2019 the Community Technology & Telecommunications Commission (CTTC) committed unanimously to organize a Digital Inclusion Stakeholder Summit during Digital Inclusion Week (DIW) 2020. Due to the impact of COVID-19 on public events over the next two years planning for this event shifted to DIW2023.

The Digital Inclusion Stakeholder Summit will educate stakeholders about the Digital Divide, and raise awareness about Digital Inclusion focused entities and DIW2023, all while convening representative stakeholders on October 2, 2023, from critical parts of the Digital Inclusion Ecosystem for a day of intentional programming to help align goals, strategies and outcomes, as well as celebrate successes.

After a meeting with Google Fiber Government Affairs contact, Jon-Michael Cortez, with Chair Pitts, Google Fiber provided a WG update and briefing at our July 2023 CTTC meeting sharing updates about their Commuity Connections Program Interest in sponsoring the Digital Inclusion Stakeholder Summit.

b. Next: Follow up with Jon-Michael Cortez about potential Summit sponsorship. Formalize an engagement strategy with all local carriers, including discussion on broadband standards and upskilling/workforce development programs.

Continue ILA Travis County - COA - CTTC - to conduct community circles and yield data-driven community needs analysis. Included a door-to-door survey analysis by Travis County. That data is being made ready

Dashboard created to help make decisions.

We have convened 3 advisory groups to help us convene the conversations that will take place. 19 Nonprofit entities are being remediated 2k each for full participation. Community participants are being remediated at \$50.

The data yield will inform both the Travis County and COA strategic plans. UT is also partnering with COA to create the newest strategic plan.

7. Emergency Broadband Relief Carrier Evaluation (Central TX BDO)

a. Historical: Commission requested engagement from TARA office and CTD. A variety of responses were provided. Recent legislation has likely increased the number of responses and the need to confirm who is participating. COA, CTTC, and Travis teams participated. Provide a community report on all providers who responded and those who didn't. Need to consider creating a provider map that highlights what carriers are available for what neighborhoods to enable competition and consumer advocacy.

Ongoing TX BDO participation by CTTC, COA, and Travis County since 2021 culminating in our participation at the first in-person Capital Region meeting.

b. Next: This effort is currently being managed by the TX BDO who has mapped out the unserved and underserved areas, which can be and has been challenged by households, businesses, and organizations. Encourage Commissioner participation and information shareouts from staff liaison, while avoiding a walking quorum. Encourage mapping challenges and consider outreach strategy to enable education about the challenge process. Ask the staff liaison to send out an invitation to participate in the upcoming Burnet TX BDO in-person meeting on 7/21/2023.

 - a. Historical: Ongoing discussions about the impact of Federal, State, and County policy and actions on the City of Austin decision-making. Regular briefings from Rondella Hawkins, Officer, TARA, and CTD, staff.
