### **Posting Language**

Set a public hearing to consider an ordinance to amend City Code Title 25 related to environmental protections at the Ann and Roy Butler Hike and Bike Trail. (Suggested date: February 29, 2024, at Austin City Hall, 301 W. 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, Austin, Texas).

### **Lead Department**

Watershed Protection Department.

### **Prior Council Action:**

May 18, 2023 - Council adopted Resolution No. 20230518-044 initiating amendments to City Code Title 25 to allow the Ann and Roy Butler Hike-and-Bike Trail to remain within the setbacks applicable to Lady Bird Lake and to allow capital improvements related to environmental protection be made to the trail.

### **Additional Backup Information:**

In 2017, City Code Section 25-8-261 (*Critical Water Quality Zone Development*) was amended to restrict development within the 50-foot setback of Lady Bird Lake, including the construction of trails like the existing Ann and Roy Butler Hike-and-Bike Trail (Butler Trail). Approximately 85% of the Butler Trail is located within the 50-foot setback, and the restriction makes it more difficult to enhance, reconstruct, and build the Butler Trail in its current alignment.

Staff requests an amendment to Section 25-8-261 to accommodate the current Butler Trail alignment and width while continuing to provide protection to the shoreline through mitigation and improvements to the

health of the floodplain.
