PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1950 duplex.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story cross-gabled Ranch dwelling with stone veneer, a two-story rear addition, and a detached garage.

RESEARCH

The house at 1403 Elton Lane was built in 1950 by Kelly DeBusk. It is unclear whether Kelly DeBusk, Sr. or Kelly DeBusk, Jr. is listed on the initial permit for the home, as both father and son were involved in the construction industry: DeBusk, Sr. as the manager of the Lamar Lumber Company, and DeBusk, Jr. as an architectural engineer and prominent Austin homebuilder. Kelly DeBusk, Sr. and his wife, Katie DeBusk, lived in the home until DeBusk, Sr.'s death in 1952. Katie DeBusk continued to live in the home until at least the 1960s, renting out half of the duplex to students, servicemen, and others. DeBusk was the only child of an early pioneering family in Bell County, and was active in charitable organizations and University of Texas service clubs until her death in 1971.


PROPERTY EVALUATION

Designation Criteria—Historic Landmark

- 1) The building is more than 50 years old.
- 2) The building appears to retain moderate integrity. Modern outbuildings and a modern two-story addition have been added to the rear of the property, though they are set far back from the street. Windows have been replaced.
- 3) Properties must meet two criteria for landmark designation (LDC §25-2-352). Staff has evaluated the property and determined that it does not meet two criteria:
 - a. Architecture. The building does not appear to convey architectural significance.
 - b. Historical association. The property is associated with the DeBusk family.
 - c. Archaeology. The property was not evaluated for its potential to yield significant data concerning the human history or prehistory of the region.
 - d. Community value. The property was not evaluated for its ability to possess a unique location, physical characteristic, or significant feature that contributes to the character, image, or cultural identity of the city, the neighborhood, or a particular demographic group.
 - e. Landscape feature. The property is not a significant natural or designed landscape with artistic, aesthetic, cultural, or historical value to the city.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage rehabilitation and adaptive reuse, but release the demolition permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package.



Artist To Technician To Artist

Artist to technician to artist. This is the story of Kelly DeBusk and it's an interesting one.

And, the prominent Austinhome builder will exhibit his, dual talents Sunday with a oneman art show and an open house in a new model at 6100 Highlandale, just off Bullcreek Road in Northwest Hills.

The exceptional artistic talents of DeBusk became apparent at the age of 10 when, in Temple, Texas, one of the city's leading artists began giving him private instructions with hopes of directing him into a career in art.

During the years that followed DeBusk did follow this course and, in the early 30's entered Texas Christian University as an art major, where he studied under the renowned S. P. Ziegler. In 1953, he transferred to UT to further his training under the direction of Professors Gideon and Everett, During this period many DeBusk paintings were sold by the Bradford Galleries.

UT, at the time, did not have a school of fine arts, so DeBusk enrolled as an architectural engineering student. After taking all the art courses offered by the University, he transferred to Art Center School at Los Angeles.

These, of course, were lean days for artists, thus DeBusk turned to the home building and Commercial construction industries for livelihood.

With his architectural and engineering training, and as the son of a Temple lumberman, the building industry was a matural choice and, as the past 30 years will testify, a wise one.

DeBusk built his first home on Indian Trail in 1938, which was then on the western edge of the city.

Except for the war years, DeBusk's main interest remained with home building.

"During all this time I was still painting, if only in my mind," DeBusk said, "But I also felt home building gave me an opportunity to use creative skills in designing."

The net result is that DeBusk has provided thousands of Austinites with unique homes.

He continued to do so and Sunday he will reveal his talents with a combination open house and art show at 6100 Highlandale, in Northwest Hills.

The two story, two-and-a-half bath, four bedroom and study home is constructed of native stone trimmed in rich brown, rough sawn cedar, and surrounded with native trees.
