## **PROPOSAL**

---

Rehabilitate building, add metal awnings, replace storefront, and repoint brick.

## **PROJECT SPECIFICATIONS**

---

North Elevation: Add a new metal awning to this building per 1970s photo. Repair and repoint the existing brick wall as needed and maintain the existing lighting on the storefront. Replace the existing storefront.

## **ARCHITECTURE**

---

One-story masonry commercial building with transom windows above awning, simple detailing at cornice, and a stepped walkway to a basement level at Waller Creek.

## **RESEARCH**

---

The building at 709 East Sixth Street, addressed throughout the years as 705-709 East Sixth Street, was built around 1906. It first served as the grocery store of Abraham Tannous and his family, lauded as “the best-known Syrian” in Austin in his 1923 obituary. Tannous shared the space with a jeweler, a confectioner, and various private rentals at the rear of the shops. After his retirement, the building housed Mamie and George Hodges’ fruit stand and soda fountain, Charles Gregory’s jewelry store, and a variety of smaller groceries. By the late 1930s, Abraham Nassour and Namie Jacob had taken up the grocery businesses in the building, though by the mid-forties, Nassour transitioned his business to Abe’s Place, a package store. Nassour had previously run a saloon at 721 East Sixth Street alongside his brother, also a grocer. The brothers, born in Beirut, were also part of the larger community of Syrian and Lebanese merchants who helped to establish 6<sup>th</sup> Street as a bustling business district in the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> centuries.

## **DESIGN STANDARDS**

---

The City of Austin’s [Historic Design Standards](#) (March 2021) are based on the Secretary of the Interior’s Standards for Rehabilitation and are used to evaluate projects in National Register districts. The following standards apply to the proposed project:

### *Repair and alterations*

#### *1. General standards*

The proposed project removes mostly non-historic material.

#### *4. Exterior walls and trim*

The proposal includes repair of historic-age brick.

#### *11. Commercial storefronts*

The proposed storefront and awning are appropriate in scale and design for the district.

### *Summary*

The project meets the applicable standards. The applicant has amended the design to reflect Committee feedback.

## **PROPERTY EVALUATION**

---

The property is listed as noncontributing to the Sixth Street National Register district, but the 2022 Sixth Street Snapshot resurvey recommends the property as contributing to the Sixth Street National Register Historic District.

### *Designation Criteria—Historic Landmark*

- 1) The building is more than 50 years old.
- 2) The building appears to retain high integrity, though the storefront has been replaced.
- 3) Properties must meet two criteria for landmark designation (LDC §25-2-352). Staff has evaluated the property and determined that it may meet two criteria for landmark designation:

- a.* Architecture. The building is a one-part commercial block with limited architectural distinction.
- b.* Historical association. The property is associated with the Tannous and Nassour families.
- c.* Archaeology. The property was not evaluated for its potential to yield significant data concerning the human history or prehistory of the region.
- d.* Community value. The property was not evaluated for its ability to possess a unique location, physical characteristic, or significant feature that contributes to the character, image, or cultural identity of the city, the neighborhood, or a particular demographic group. However, continued research into the Lebanese and Syrian business community who helped to establish 6<sup>th</sup> Street as a center of commerce may further reveal this building's role in their success.
- e.* Landscape feature. The property is not a significant natural or designed landscape with artistic, aesthetic, cultural, or historical value to the city.

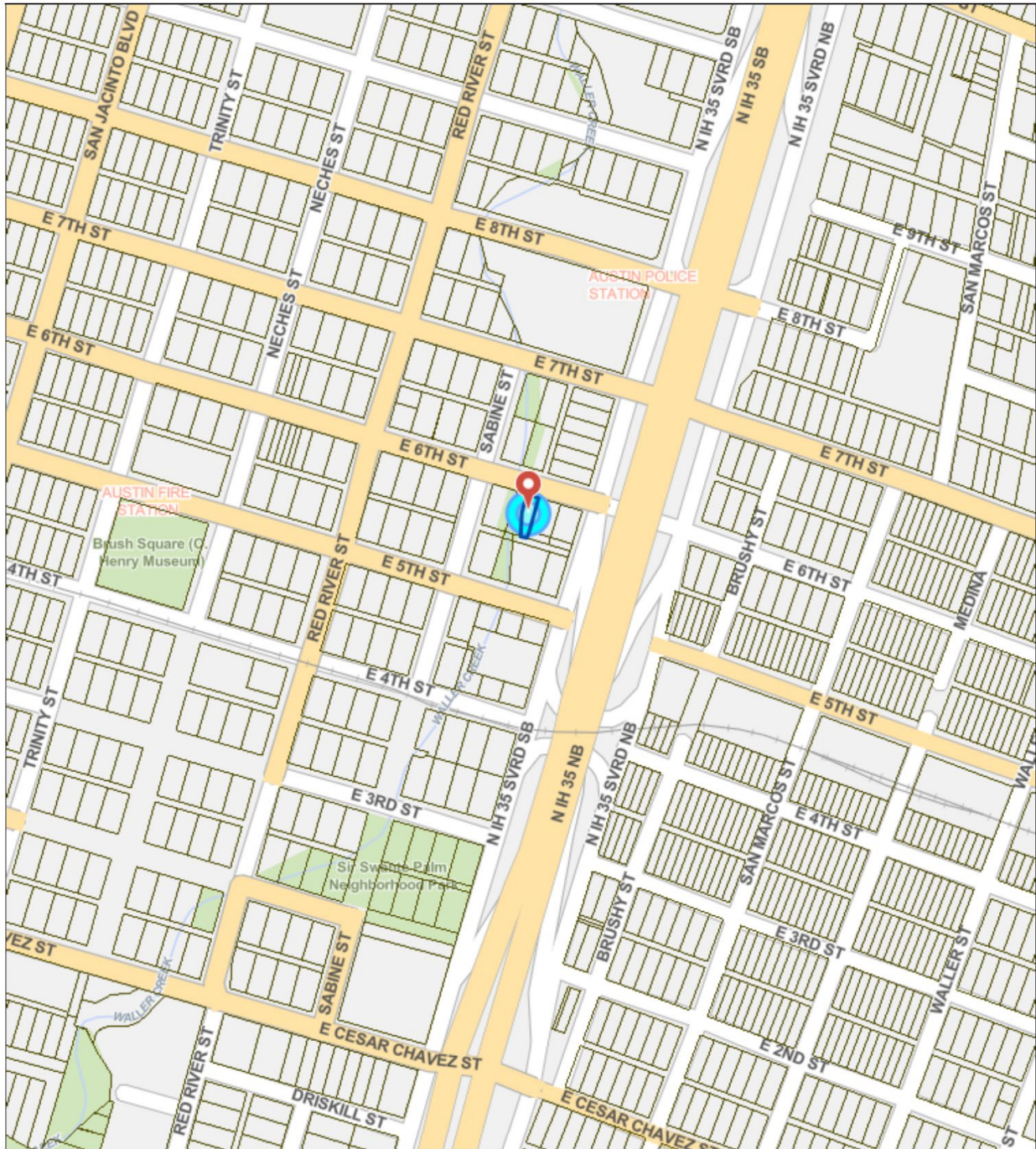

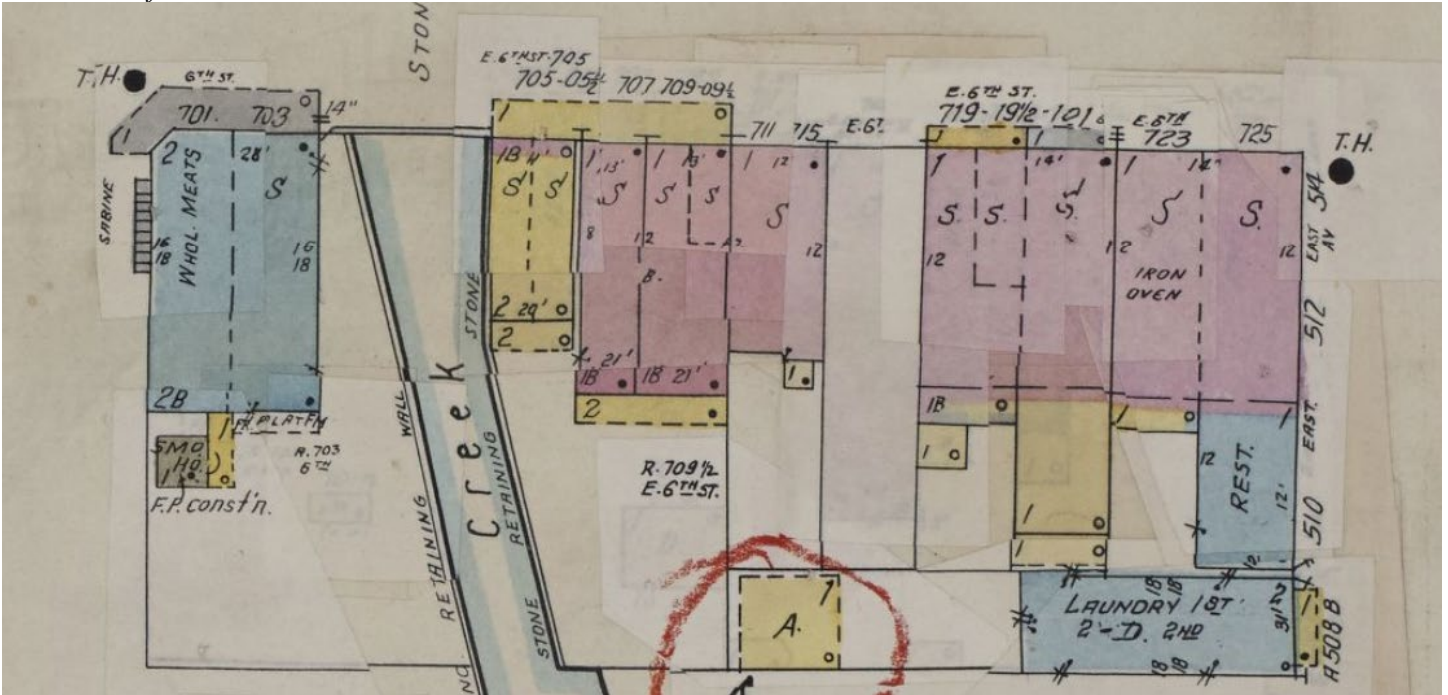

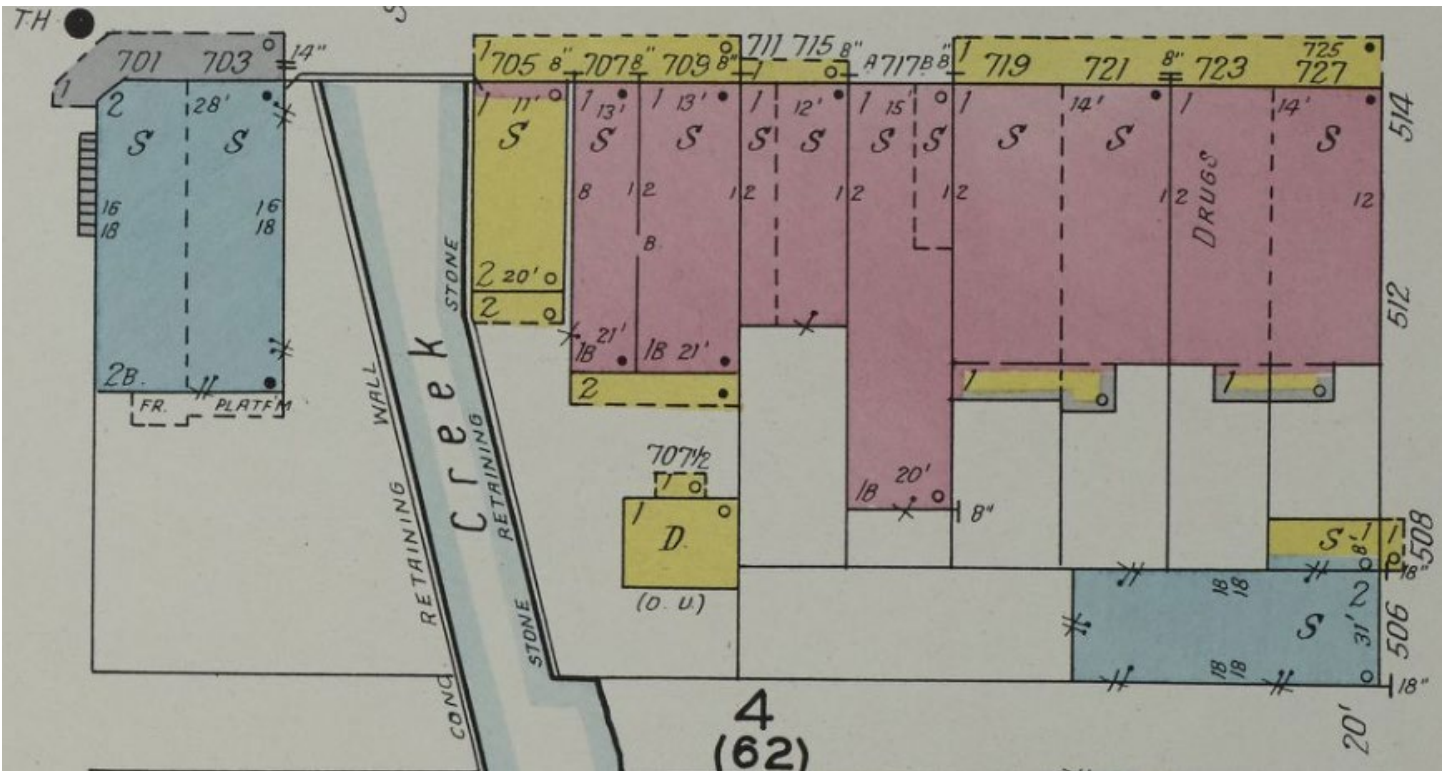

## ASSYRIAN MERCHANTS QUARREL; ONE DROPS DEAD IN HIS STORE

**Abraham Tannous Succumbs to  
Excitement; Police Called in  
to Quell Disturbance.**

Abraham Tannous, Assyrian merchant at 805 East Sixth Street, fell dead in his store shortly before noon today. Tannous a few months ago suffered a paralytic stroke that left him enfeebled. He quarreled this morning with Pete Thomas in the alley back of the two store buildings which Mike Thomas, also an Assyrian, father of Pete Thomas, and Tannous owned. The excitement caused a state of high blood pressure, for a few minutes after the quarrel Tannous dropped dead.

According to reports of neighbors the two families had not been on good terms for many years. The two Assyrians operated stores joining each other, and had been in business competition for the last last years.

Police Sergeant Littlepage was called to 805 East Sixth Street immediately after Tannous' death to stop a disturbance growing out of the quarrel and death of Tannous. Detectives W. H. Scott and Police Officer Joe Amstead also were called to the scene of the disturbance. They found parties to the quarrel threatening to start serious trouble. The police officers were able to stop the disturbance and restore peace.

Tannous was a man aged about 55 years. He was married and had several children.

### ABRAHAM TANNOUS.

Abraham Tannous, aged 61 years, died at his home, 805 East Sixth Street, Thursday morning at 11 o'clock. Surviving relatives are his wife, one daughter and one son. Mr. Tannous had been a resident of Austin for thirty years, during which time he had engaged in the mercantile business.

He was possibly the best known Syrian in Travis county, and was well spoken of for his honest and upright dealing with his fellow man. Funeral services will be held from St. Mary's Catholic Church this Friday at 5 p. m. Burial will be in Mount Calvary Cometary.

## EAST SIXTH ST. MAN SECURES INJUNCTION; SUES FOR DAMAGES

### Litigation Results From Affray Recently Between Business Rivals.

Application for a writ of temporary injunction to restrain Sheehan Joseph and nine co-defendants from interfering with his business at 807 East Sixth Street was granted Mike Thomas and two other plaintiffs late Tuesday afternoon by Judge George Calhoun of the Fifty-third District Court following the filing of a petition by Thomas seeking the restraining order and damages amounting to \$40,500 growing out of an affray between the Thomas and Joseph factions on the night of Dec. 8, 1923.

The plaintiffs in the case are Mike Thomas and his wife, Cecilia Thomas, and his son, Pete Thomas, who have their place of business at 807 East Sixth Street while the defendants mentioned in the petition are Sheehan Joseph, Isaac Tannous, Phillip Bashara, Bertha Tannous, Stella Moses, Mrs. Abraham Tannous, a feme sole, Mrs. Charles Bashara, Salem Joseph, Mrs. Selma Bashara and George Ferris, all of whom are said to live in the place of business owned by Mrs. Abraham Tannous at 805 East Sixth Street adjoining the Joseph store.

The petition states that as a result of the affray the three plaintiffs have been confined in a local hospital since the night of the alleged assault on Dec. 8. Mrs. Thomas had her arm broken in two places and sustained injuries to the face and body; Pete Thomas sustained a split scalp and Mike Thomas sustained bruises on his head, face and body.

## Officers Clear Woman In Bar Gun Play

No charges will be filed against a woman tavern keeper who felled two men with one shot during a Sunday night affray at the Austin Bar, 709 East Sixth Street, Police Lieutenant Merle Wells said Monday following a conference with the district and county attorneys offices.

Wounded in the leg when the shot went wild were Hill Sedillo, 33, and his brother-in-law, Jesse Banda, 36. Police Detective Frank Monk said the two men were not involved in the disturbance.

Susan Duarte, tavern owner, told police five men began throwing bottles at her when she attempted to stop a row at their table. She said she fired one shot as the men began leaving, explaining she became excited as they were still hurling bottles at her. The disturbers had disappeared by the time police arrived.

Sedillo and Banda were released after emergency treatment at Brackenridge Hospital.
