



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Mexic-Arte Museum

- Founded in 1984 by Austin artists Sylvia Orozco, Sam Coronado, and Pio Pulido, the museum is dedicated to the presentation and promotion of Mexican, Latino, and Latin American art and culture.
- Designated by the 78th legislature as the Official Mexican and Mexican American Fine Art Museum of Texas, Mexic-Arte began its exhibition schedule with the Day of the Dead Festival in 1984.
- The museum moved to its current location on Congress Avenue in 1988. Since then, it has built upon a diverse series of programs and presentations to introduce the best of the emerging artists of the U.S., Mexico, and Latin America to the art scene in Austin.
- The museum maintains a permanent collection and archive of collected works for use in changing exhibits. Over 75,000 visitors come to the museum each year. Educational programming for school children is provided at the site.
- Mission Statement The Mexic-Arte Museum is dedicated to enriching the community through education programs, exhibitions, and the collection, preservation, and interpretation of Mexican, Latino, and Latin American art and culture for visitors of all ages.







City of Austin

- 1993 The upper levels of the museum were closed to public access, related to existing conditions of egress and structural load capacity for assembly use.
- 2001 General Fund expenditure for purchase of the 419 Congress building as a permanent home for the Mexic-Arte Museum.
- 2010 Voter approved bond funds from the 2006 bond authorized for rehabilitation of the facility.
- 2018 Additional voter approved bond funds from the 2018 bond allocated for rehabilitation of the facility.
- 2020 City Council authorized use of Construction Manager-at -Risk alternate delivery project method.
- 2021 Architect selected for the project.
- 2022 Construction Manager-at-Risk selected for the project.
- COA Economic Development Department and Capital Delivery Services serve as project managers.
- Construction budget of \$12,000,000 established.






Scope Summary


- Rehabilitation of the Mexic-Arte Museum
- Fully functional multi-story facility

Permanent and temporary exhibit spaces, first level museum store, event preparation space, load in/out area, ADA/TAS accessibility, storage, offices, a library, wood shop, circulation space, reception area, accessible roof top area usable for events, collection storage, outdoor public art component in collaboration with AIPP, expanded sidewalks, fire detection and suppression micro-climate controls for varied spaces, public meeting rooms, exhibit appropriate lighting and ability for full assembly occupancy during events.

- Building must meet standards and comply with guidelines of American Alliance of Museums
- Building must help achieve the characteristic of excellence for US Museums from the AAM
- The main facade of the building must be preserved/restored
