





OUR **ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

What We've Built

SCHOOL PROGRAMS

We've built programs in every Austin ISD school and partner with teachers in 45 Texas school districts and 40 states. In Austin ISD, guitar now has more students enrolled than orchestra or choir.

JUVENILE JUSTICE

We created Texas' first and only daily, for-credit performing arts courses for incarcerated youth. Started in 2010, we now teach guitar every school day in five lock-down facilities between Austin and Dallas.

BRAILLE LEARNING

We installed and funded Texas School for the Blind's first guitar instructor in 2010 and subsequently developed the world's first braille-based learning system for guitar, now used around the globe.







OUR CURRICULUM

Launched in 2008, GuitarCurriculum is a groundbreaking approach to classroom guitar instruction. An extensive teacher resource, it provides the foundation for all our programs and the platform for our scalability.



TEACHER TRAINING

Since 2009 ACG has trained hundreds of teachers across the US and beyond, with special concentrations in Austin, Houston, El Paso, Atlanta, Cleveland, St. Louis and Columbia, South Carolina.



LEARNING INFRASTRUCTURE

Developing an entirely new course subject requires advocacy and deep structural support to promote growth and advance best practices. Since 2014, ACG has created and disseminated procedures for conducting district- and region-wide assessment events for large guitar ensembles, establishing standards for performance and helping programs across the state foster a culture of excellence.





THE **CHALLENGE**

Teens are struggling with isolation and depression.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention between 2011 and 2021 the rate at which teens 'experienced persistent feelings of sadness or hopelessness' rose from an average of 28% to 43%.

In a May 2023 Health advisory the US Surgeon General warns of loneliness epidemic with findings including, "Lacking social connection can increase the risk for premature death as much as smoking up to 15 cigarettes a day."

In a June 2023 review of 43 research papers, the US National Institutes of Health concluded that social media use contributes to depression, anxiety, poor sleep, low self-esteem, and social and appearance anxiety.

THE **RESEARCH**

Music Can help


A 2009 study by the University of Texas School of Social Work found that ACG's guitar education programs in schools positively impacted students' self-esteem, sense of belonging, self-confidence, and willingness to make and learn from their own mistakes.

According to the 2023 State of the Arts Report by Texas Cultural Trust, "Texas high school students enrolled in more arts courses had better attendance, higher pass rates on standardized tests, and were more likely to attend college than their peers taking only the minimum arts requirement." Arts-engaged students were:


- Up to 112% and more likely to earn an exceptional score on standardized tests.
- 20% more likely to attend college.
- 42% more likely to attend a four-year college university.

* District data from 21 campuses, about 1,700 guitar students, compared with non-guitarist peers matched by campus and demographic.




JUVENILE JUSTICE CENTER LONGITUDINAL STUDY, 2013-2018

makes sure whatever school they're enrolling in next is prepared to receive them with open arms. They're hooked on music! And they've accomplished something they didn't imagine they could."


