AUSTIN WINS \$105 MILLION GRANT FOR TRANSFORMATIVE OUR FUTURE 35 PROJECT



The City of Austin has been awarded a \$105.2 million Capital Construction Grant as part of the U.S. Department of Transportation's <u>Neighborhood Access and Equity Grant Program</u> (NAE), funded by the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA). The City will use this grant funding to construct a 5.3-acre freeway cap over I-35 between Cesar Chavez and Fourth Street as part of <u>Our Future 35: Austin's Cap and</u> <u>Stitch Program</u>.

The City's "Our Future 35" initiative aims to construct caps and stitches, otherwise known as platforms or lids, over portions of I-35 in Central Austin being reconstructed as part of the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) <u>Capital Express Central Project.</u>

The City's cap and stitch project provides a once-in-a-generation opportunity to change the landscape of Central Austin by building public space and amenities that celebrate and connect all Austinites.

The City applied for the grant in September and identified the freeway cap between Cesar Chavez Street and Fourth Street as a strong candidate project due to the enhanced connections it will provide residents of the East Cesar Chavez Neighborhood to downtown previously cut off by the original construction of I-35, including a potentially uninterrupted walking and biking corridor across I-35 at Third Street that requires no frontage road crossings.



The City will contribute a \$45 million local match to the project to fund a majority of the amenity construction for the Cesar Chavez to Fourth Street Cap. The City will coordinate with TxDOT on the design and engineering of the cap structure and anticipates a robust public process to determine the design of amenities on top that will be constructed after the structure is built.

The City continues to explore funding and phasing strategies for other caps and stitches, including additional grants, philanthropy, and other sources.



RECONSTRUCTION COMING TO I-35 CAPITAL EXPRESS CENTRAL

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is about to begin a major reconstruction of Interstate 35 through Austin. The upper deck will be removed, and the highway will be lowered below ground level through downtown and widened to include non-tolled high occupancy vehicle managed lanes.

The project will transform Central Austin around the highway. The City, the University of Texas and TxDOT are exploring plans to build a series of "caps and stitches" over the lowered section of the highway. Caps are wide decks that would allow the community to reclaim the space over the highway and stitches are widened bridges that would improve mobility over the highway. How the spaces will be used will eventually be determined by the community.

Construction is expected to break ground by Fall 2024.



Construction is expected to last through 2032 in the following phases:

- 2024-26 East Martin Luther King Jr Boulevard JJ Seabrook Memorial Bridge
- 2024-27 drainage tunnel under I-35 and East Cesar Chavez Street
- 2024-31 Lady Bird Lake (Holly Street to East Ben White Boulevard)
- 2025-28 CapMetro Red Line bridges (Airport Boulevard and East Fourth Street)
- 2026-31 University (U.S. 290 East to East Martin Luther King Boulevard)
- 2026-32 Downtown (East Martin Luther King Boulevard to Holly Street)

The project will involve a complete reconstruction of the I-35 bridge over Lady Bird Lake that will <u>impact usage</u> of the Ann and Roy Butler Hike-and-Bike Trail and nearby parks, including some temporary closures.



TRANSPORTATION AND PUBLIC WORKS UNVEILS 2023 ANNUAL REPORT

AUS WELCOMES VIVA AEROBUS AS NEWEST INTERNATIONAL AIRLINE

In September of 2023 the Mexican carrier Viva Aerobus announced its arrival to Austin by launching nonstop flights to Monterrey, Mexico. On March 22, 2024, this year-round service started operating four days per week. Viva Aerobus, which now joins Austin-Bergstrom International Airport as Central Texas' 19th airline, offers the newest fleet of aircraft out all other Mexican airlines.

As the demand for international travel grows in Central Texas, AUS has launched an improvement project for the International Arrivals facility. The project, which is currently in design, will add more baggage carousels and increase space for passenger processing to improve the experience for arriving international passengers. These improvements are part of the airport's work to deliver near-term terminal improvement through the Journey With AUS program.



AUS RESPONDS TO SPRING FESTIVAL SEASON TRAVEL VOLUMES

In order to meet the volume and safety needs of our passengers, AUS Department of Aviation teams prepared in advance by:

- Launching a comprehensive travel tips communications campaign to advise travelers of the expected busy days & to proactively provide tips and recommendations to help travelers plan for their airport experience
- Requesting our TSA, airline and concession partners to increase staffing levels as appropriate so their operations are not inhibited by delays at checkpoints, airline ticket counters and concessions
- Proactively activating a Department Operations Center to ensure swift cross-departmental coordination in the event of an emergency or irregular operation
- Re-assigned non-frontline staff to temporarily fill in frontline roles in the terminal to assist passengers with line queuing, wayfinding and general requests for assistance
