Arthur Fehr, F.A.I.A., Austin, was unanimously elevated to the presidency of the Texas Society of Architects for 1963 by the membership of the Society at its 23rd Annual Convention in Houston.

Fehr, prominent civic leader in Austin and nationally known architect, is a 1925 architecture graduate of the University of Texas, where he was a member of Tau Beta Pi, honorary engineering fraternity.

After graduation, he engaged in graduate study at Columbia University, New York University, Beaux Arts Institute of Design, New York, and extensive European study and travel.

Fehr has been active in professional affairs and is a charter member of the Texas Society of Architects. He has served as President of the Central Texas Chapter, A.I.A., Director of the T.S.A. for three years, Secretary-Treasurer for three years, Vice President in 1961, President Elect in 1962, leading to his elevation to the presidency in 1963.

After experience in architectural offices in New York and San Antonio and with the National Park Service, Fehr opened his office in Austin in 1937. He later formed a partnership with Mr. Charles Granger, also of Austin, and this firm has won many state and national architectural design awards. The firm has been honored for the Austin Airport Terminal, St. Stephens School Chapel, Westwood Country Club, Brown Schools in San Marcos, several buildings on the campus of the Texas Lutheran College at Seguin, and the Nurses Home, Wharton.

Fehr is currently serving on the A.I.A. Public Relations Committee as an executive member. He has been active in all phases of Austin civic and social life, having served as President of the Austin Symphony in 1960, on the vestry of St. David's Church for three years, United Fund campaigns, PTA work, and currently is a member of a civic committee to re-write the zoning ordinance for the city of Austin.

He is a member of Town and Gown.

Mr. Fehr is married to the former Mary Jane Grant, San Antonio, and the Fehrs have three sons—Kilian, Grant and John.

Midcentury modern masters' iconic works show at AIA Austin

Aug 14, 2017 — AIA Austin and the Austin History Center display the midcentury modern masters' iconic works in photographs.

For approximately two decades, one architectural firm ruled modernism this town—especially when it came to commercial building. That firm was Fehr & Granger.

The firm was founded in 1946 by fellow architects Arthur Fehr and Charles Granger, who originally met on the site of the still-extant Bastrop State Park Cabins, designed by Fehr for the National Park Service from 1934 to 1936, when Granger was still a student working on the site. The firm went on to design some of Austin's most well-known and celebrated modernist structures, including the Robert Mueller Airport (now redeveloped as a planned community), O. Henry Junior High School, Saint Stephen's Chapel, Austin National Bank Drive-In, and the St. Elmo-tel in South Austin, as well as their own firm's building, which is still operational and can be seen (kind of—a lot of foliage has grown in since it was built) at 403 East 15th Street.

Fehr & Granger designed some stunning residential structures as well, including the Sneed residence in 1953 (fun fact! the Sneeds were Carly Fiorina's parents) and the International style Darnall House, which has just been renovated and received a City of Austin landmark designation.

Whatever the function of the building, the firm used its modernist sensibilities to create structures that functioned well in the often-brutal, pre-air-conditioned Central Texas environment, in ways often compared to those of Richard Neutra. Like Neutra, Fehr & Granger paid careful attention to siting, shade, ventilation, and other important environmental factors to create a "healthy" interaction between indoors and outdoors.

From Aug. 15 through Nov. 15, the Austin History Center, in conjunction with the Austin chapter of the American Institute of Architects, will present an exhibit of photographs of F&G's pioneering at the Austin Center for Architecture, 801 West 12th Street. In conjunction with the exhibit, later this month the history center will showcase the work of Dewey Mears, who photographed F&G buildings, as well as many others, and was considered "preeminent architectural photographer in Central Texas in the late 20th century," according to the center's website.

THE CCC AT BASTROP STATE PARK

Working for the National Park Service from 1934 to 1936, Arthur Fehr designed cabins and supervised the building of the refectory at Bastrop State Park in Bastrop Texas. A showplace of materials and craftsmanship, the park earned a National Historic Landmark designation in 1997, one of only 7 Civilian Conservation Corps state parks across the nation awarded that honor. 

EXTERIOR ELEMENTS INCLUDE A FACADE OF UNPAINTED CORRUGATED ASBESTOS PANELS AND A GLASS REAR FLEVATION

Minimalist aesthetics have made a resurgence in recent years and you can see examples of midcentury modern design almost everywhere you look. The Austin History Center, in conjunction with the Austin chapter of the American Institute of Architects, presented a new exhibit, Fehr & Granger, Architects – Austin Modernists at the Austin Center for Architecture, 801 West 12th St. Fehr & Granger were some of the first architects to bring modernist architectural design to Central Texas post-World War II.

ABOUT THE EXHIBIT

Fehr & Granger, Architects was established by Arthur Fehr and Charles Granger in Austin in 1946 when the era of Mid-Century Modernism was just beginning in the United States. Both men graduated with degrees in architecture from the University of Texas before going on to further study, apprentice with well-known modernist architects, and travel throughout Europe where modernist design had an earlier start.





Becker Elementary School Addition

Additions of a school cafeteria, gymnasium and auditorium to Becker Elementary School were designed by Fehr and Granger with a ground breaking in May of 1947. The project required permission from the Austin Zoning Board to extend frontage restrictions in order to fit the new structures on the site. The cafeteria and auditorium wrap around a giant oak tree, creating a court with a covered walkway between the buildings that connects to the gymnasium.


